President Taft Saturday night signed the Army Appropriation Bill carrying approximately \$80,000,000 and promulgating the reforms in the organization of the war department.

Orders have just been received at the Puget Sound Navy Yard for the armored cruiser Colorado to proceed to Corinto and join the fleet in the command of Rear-Admiral Southard. The cruiser Cleveland is ordered to follow the Colorado as soon as possible.

The San Francisco Call today says Governor Hiram Johnson does not expect to be elected Vice-President of the United States this fall. In the defeat of the Bull Moose movement this year, the Governor of California sees the first march of a crusade that may make him the successful candidate for the presidency in 1916.

A new phase has been put upon the Penrose-Roosevelt controversy by the demands of Colonel Roosevelt himself. In a telegram to Senator Clapp, chairman of the congressional investigation committee, he asks that he be given an opportunity to appear before a committee tomorrow to reply to the charge of Penrose in connection with the Standard Oil Company contribution.

Claims aggregating only \$32,000, coming from States as far apart as Oregon, Virginia and Texas and Maryland, many of them claims dating from the Civil War, may keep Congress sitting longer than was expected.

The Suez Canal Company declared it is a mistake to imagine that the reduction of ten cents per ton of the Suez Canal dues is in any way connected with the Panama Canal. Plans to push through the development of a vast mercantile marine for China are under way here, and another shipping struggle of tremendous importance is regarded as certain.

A cable from Sydney says the Oceanic Steamship Company's liner Ventura left there yesterday. The liner is bringing a large number of passengers, among them being Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador to the United States.

It is denied in Rome that Pietro Mascagni, the famous composer, and his wife, have patched up their matrimonial differences.

Miss Lillenthal, a beautiful sixteen-year-old girl, has challenged the Hawaiian swimmer, Duke Kahanamoku, to a swimming race in the waters of Long Island Sound. She has made no definite terms and the challenge as yet is unanswered.

Miss Thal is the youngest member of the United States Volunteer Life-Saving Corps and she is credited with having saved the lives of more people in the last few years in the waters about New York than have all the other women swimmers of the city combined.

The Kaiserin, according to all accounts from Berlin, is in an exceedingly precarious condition of health and does not respond to treatment. All her engagements for the coming season have been abandoned. Much stress is laid on the fact that the crown princess' seclusion has been abruptly closed so that the crown princess may be in Berlin soon.

White Star line officials have announced that, following a decision taken some time ago, immediately after the finding of the Titanic court of inquiry, the directors have now taken the final steps in the alteration of the plans for the Gigantic, the new and greater sister ship of the lost liner.

"My son will be the last of the Emperors. That is why I am bringing him up as I was brought up, under firm discipline. He must be a credit to the House of Hohenzollern and to the throne, that, after him, will cease to be." Emperor William thus expressed himself to Historian Karl von Kroon, in a talk following his inspection of the Berlin School of History and Literature.

He was driven to the Foreign Office Building, formerly occupied by President Yuen Shih-Kai, in an elegant open carriage expressly made for the occasion, drawn by white horses with gold-mounted harness in yellow silk reins. The streets were lined with 4000 soldiers. There were large throngs at the street corners, but there was no cheering.

President Taft, with the exception of filling a few engagements, expects to stay at Beverly until election time.

With the idea that the country is tired of stumping tours, Governor Wilson announced today that his present plan calls for very few campaign speeches.

Governor Oswald West, of Oregon, has served notice on the authorities of Portland and Multnomah county that Monday he proposes to institute a moral "house-cleaning" in Portland with the help of the local authorities, if they will give it, without, if they do not care to assist, and in spite of them if they try to block his effort. The Governor says he is going to "clean up if it takes him to January."

Detachments of bluejackets from the gunboat Annapolis and the collier Justian are patrolling the city at night; an armed guard of volunteers, made up largely of the foreign element, acting as police during the day, and all the foreign women and children in port sleeping on the American naval vessels, described the situation in Corinto, according to the last report from American Consul Johnson.

San Jorgue, a town on the coast of the province of Divan, was bombarded for hours yesterday by insurgents from the steamer Victoria, in Lake Nicaragua.

An alleged plot to kill Representative Benjamin K. Johnson of Kentucky, chairman of the house committee on the District of Columbia, so as to head off certain proposed legislation, has been disclosed to Johnson, and a sworn statement has put the Kentucky man and his friends on guard.

Despite the general belief that Congress would wind up the business of the long session and adjourn yesterday afternoon, last night found the end still apparently some days away.

No fewer than twenty-four thousand workmen filed past the bier of Gen. William Booth between five-thirty and nine o'clock this morning. The scene was an intensely impressive one as the men walked bare headed to the Congress hall.

The House Committee on War Department expenditures reported that Major Beecher Ray, U. S. A., whom the President nominated Saturday to be deputy paymaster-general of the army, had been engaged in political activity, particularly in the interests of President Taft; had been four times tried for serious offenses, and never been disciplined more severely than by reprimand.

Joseph E. Davies of Wisconsin, secretary of the Democratic National Committee, announces that Rudolph Spreckels of California, and John J. Deline of Wisconsin, both supporters of United States Senator LaFollette in his campaign for the Republican nomination, have agreed to head an organization to work for Woodrow Wilson in the presidential campaign.

King Nicholas of Montenegro has called out his entire army and there is great excitement on the frontier where fighting goes on with Turkey as though was declared, telegrams the correspondent at Constantinople of the Daily Chronicle.

Speaker Clark, Saturday, delivering the valedictory of the Democratic House of the Sixty-Second Congress, asserted that historians would declare with absolute truth that the house Democrats of the Sixty-Fifth and Sixty-Second Congress "did great things" and "have made a sweeping Democratic victory approximately certain, a victory that will give us the House, the Senate and the President."

London Saturday night was entirely cut off from telegraphic communication with the rest of the country and with the continent and for a time connection with America was severed as a result of a fire this evening in the general postoffice at Saint Martin Le Grand's, where the central telegraphic office is located and from which all wires of the service radiate.

Somewhere south of Juarez, Pascual Orozco with six hundred followers, is said to be hemmed in by federals and his chance of escape is reported as problematical.

President Taft has signed the bill to extend the pure food law to control the mixed branding of nostrums.

The provision in the appropriation bill which was passed by the House today, relating to the Waihalua water rights, was struck out of the bill before its passage. There was a hard fight made by the friends of the provision, which provided for the lease of the water rights in the military reservation to the Waihalua Agricultural Company, but it was in vain.

District Attorney Whitman of New York is investigating the death of Miss Julia Curran in a downtown hotel. The police, after suppressing the news for sixteen hours and allowing the girl's maie companion to escape, reported that Miss Curran died from natural causes.

The resolution of Representative Norris of Nebraska, Republican, calling on the State Department to report the facts surrounding the killing of James Ward Rogers in the African jungle was adopted today by the House.

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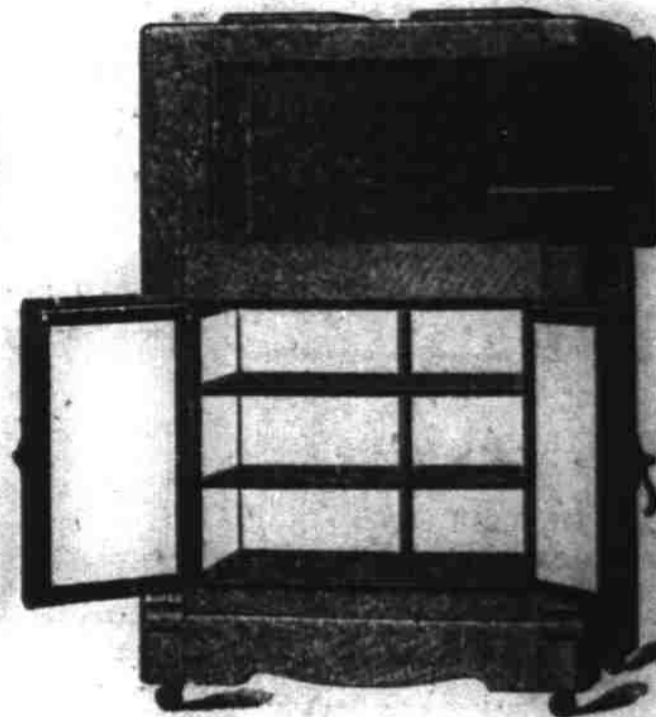
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
