Powerful additions to the United States Navy, in order to meet modern conditions, are recommended by the general board of the navy, of which Admiral Dewey is chairman. The building program of the board embraces the construction of four battleships, having the general characteristics of the new dreadnought Pennsylvania, two swift armored cruisers, eight torpedo boat destroyers, ten fuel ships, a hospital ship and a proportionate number of auxiliaries.

The board argues that the proposed increase is necessary for the proper defense of the coast, commerce and possessions of the United States, as well as to keep pace with the naval plans of other first-class powers.

It is contemplated that the increase shall be made gradually by proportionate annual appropriations by Congress.

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
