SHINGLE SAYS KUHIO IS FOR INTERESTS OF PEOPLE

Urges Voters to Put Republican Legislature in Office to Carry Out Platform

The Republicans of the ninth precinct of the fifth district last night entertained at a generous banquet beneath a tent near the Kahili polo grounds, some four hundred and fifty persons enjoying the Republican platform and listening to the musical and political speeches.

One of the features of the program was an address by United States District Attorney R. W. Breckons. Breckons said he was born a Republican and had been a Republican for more years than he was willing to confess, though he appeared youthful enough with his sandy hair and boyish smile.

Breckons referred to the desperation of McCandless at this eleventh hour, descending to falsities in a vain endeavor to bolster up his losing cause.

Robert W. Shingle told the people of the new wrinkle of Mayor Fern, puffed up with what he considered his safety in Honolulu, deserting his post at this last minute to go campaigning on another island as a backer of Link McCandless, with whom he had not previously been on the best of terms.

Shingle spoke earnestly for the election of Kuhio who certainly deserved two years more in congress to continue the excellent work he had been doing for this territory; emphasizing the fact that Kuhio's heart was in his work for the Americanization of these islands.

Speaking rather to those of the audience who were not confirmed Republicans, he said: "You Democrats who are afraid of Fern and afraid of the administration being controlled by the big interests. I appeal to you to take Kuhio's advice and vote the straight Republican ticket."

A. L. Castle, candidate for the house of representatives, spoke well and interestingly of the work in view at the next term of the legislature.

Edwin H. Paris, candidate for supervisor, seems very strong in this precinct. He was warmly welcomed and delivered an address that pleased his hearers.

BIGGEST BOND ON RECORD

What is believed to be the largest bond ever given in any judicial matter here has just been filed, it being that of E. Faxon Bishop and the Hawaiian Trust Co. Ltd. as executors under the will and of the estate of Mrs. Cordelia Church Allen.

The bond was executed by the executors with the National Surety Co. as surety, being signed by E. Faxon Bishop personally, the Hawaiian Trust Co. Ltd., by J. R. Galt, treasurer and manager, and I. Abrams, secretary, and the National Surety Co. by William F. Gaynor and H. H. Walker, attorneys-in-fact.

It is a joint and several bond. Very few surety companies have authority to issue a bond of this size. Another large bond of the National Surety Co. was issued this week, being that of Mary Beatrice Campbell Beckley, as co-trustee of the estate of the late Abigail K. Campbell Parker.

OLDEST COLLEGE GRADUATE IN AMERICA IS DEAD

NEW YORK, October 29.—William Rankin, Williams College '31, probably the oldest college graduate in America, died this afternoon at Clifton, N. J., at the home of his son, Professor Walter M. Rankin of Princeton University. He was 102 years old on September 15th. Rankin's last appearance on a college campus was in June, 1902.

ROSE DEFENDS POLICE RECORD

An enthusiastic greeting met the Democratic candidates last night at their meeting at Mokuia, Kalihi, a few blocks below the Republican meeting in the premises of the Kahili Polo Factory.

Charles Rose, Deputy Sheriff, was the center of attraction. He took up the attack made on the police for inactivity during the labor raids of 1911.

Referring to the labor recruit by Labor Agent Craig, who came in the Senator, Rose said that he only advised Craig as to the laws, covering the emigration of laborers from the Territory. He advised him, continued Rose, to take out a labor license, in order to enable him to recruit laborers.

He said further that when Attorney Kinney asked the police authorities to seize and open the safes of F. K. Makino, the Japanese high-wage leader, during the strike troubles of 1909, Sheriff Jarrett and he refused to comply with this request.

Angered by the refusal by Jarrett, said Rose, Kinney went to the High Sheriff Henry and had the safes opened illegally.

Rose was listened to attentively, and the Democratic voters often interrupted him with cheers.

Col. C. J. McCarthy, for treasurer, made one of the strongest speeches of the evening. He said that the Republicans, as usual, have been making all kinds of promises, but that in the past, after they were elected to office, they forgot the people and only worked for the interests of the rich people. The Hawaiians cheered him and promised their "kokuas" on election day.

The other candidates who addressed the audience were equally well received.

POLICE FAIL TO PROTECT REPUBLICAN MEETINGS

A mounted policeman rode up to a Republican gathering at the corner of Luau and Punchbowl streets last Tuesday night and inquired of one of the bystanders: "What meeting is this—Republican or Democratic?"

The officer of the law was informed that it was a Republican gathering. Whereupon the mounted cop rode away, leaving the meeting absolutely without an officer in attendance. And that was the night of the rumpus, when certain hoodlums undertook to jeer and hoot and boisterously interrupt the Republican speakers.

Republican meetings are notorious without police protection. While the Punchbowl Republican meeting was left to the mercy of the rough element, without police interference, the Democratic meeting in Palace square was being guarded by four members of the mounted patrol.

Rowdiness was not interfered with at the Republican rally, while uniformed officers maintained order at the Democratic meeting.
