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DEMOCRATS SPRING BIG SURPRISE; THEIR STRENGTH ON OAHU DEVELOPS!

SECOND EXTRA M'CANDLESS IN LEAD; MAUI NOW KUHIO'S HOPE

At nine o'clock tonight indications point to a split ticket being elected on Oahu.

With eleven precincts to hear from, McCandless leads Kuhio on the island of Oahu by 2528 to 2184.

Chairman Robert W. Shingle of the Republican territorial central committee prophesied that Maui would elect Cupid to Congress again.

McCandless's strength on Oahu has been a big surprise even to the Democrats. The Democratic ticket is also running very strong.

The Republicans feel sure of electing one senator, Dowsett, and probably Renton. Coke, Democrat, seems sure of election, and possibly Wirtz.

The Republican legislative ticket is running strong in the Fifth district. The Fourth district is uncertain.

Jarrett is running far ahead of Parker for sheriff, and Rose ahead of Costa for deputy.

Fern is ahead of Sam Parker by a big lead, with Hustace far behind.

The city and county ticket, however, is being counted slowly. The vote for delegate and senators was counted first.

The fight for the seven supervisors is close and hot, with McClellan, Petrie and Hardesty showing surprising strength. The Republicans claim at least three supervisors.

9:15 o'clock.—Republican leaders figure that Kuhio is running from seven to eight hundred votes behind McCandless on Oahu but feel confident the outside islands will tell a different tale.

DEMOCRATIC MANAGER SAYS WILL GIVE M'CANDLESS A BIG LEAD ON OAHU

Shortly after nine o'clock tonight Chairman Rivenburgh of the Democratic county committee issued a brief statement at the request of the Star-Bulletin, in which he declares his confidence that four Democratic supervisors will be elected.

"The results to date show that our clean and fair campaign made good with the voters," he said, "and on this island we will give McCandless a majority of seven or eight hundred votes."

LATE RETURNS FROM MAINLAND ARE ALL FOR WILSON

LOS ANGELES, Cal.—The Earl newspapers, which have been enthusiastic for Roosevelt, have conceded Wilson's election.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 5.—Wilson is conceded to have carried all States south of the Potomac, and Delaware, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts and New York. Apparently West Virginia and New Jersey are also in the Wilson column. The electoral votes apparently total 267 for Wilson, 29 for Roosevelt and 8 for Taft. Pennsylvania and Ohio are doubtful. The interior of California and San Francisco are for Wilson, but Los Angeles County goes for Roosevelt.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 5.—Registrar estimates Wilson's vote in this city at 20,000. Indications are that Northern California is strong Wilson. Wilson 124, Roosevelt 108, Taft 6, Fresno 8. San Francisco city precincts give Wilson 296 and Roosevelt 225.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 5.—First precinct of Los Angeles returns Roosevelt 62, Wilson 68, Debs 55, Taft 4.

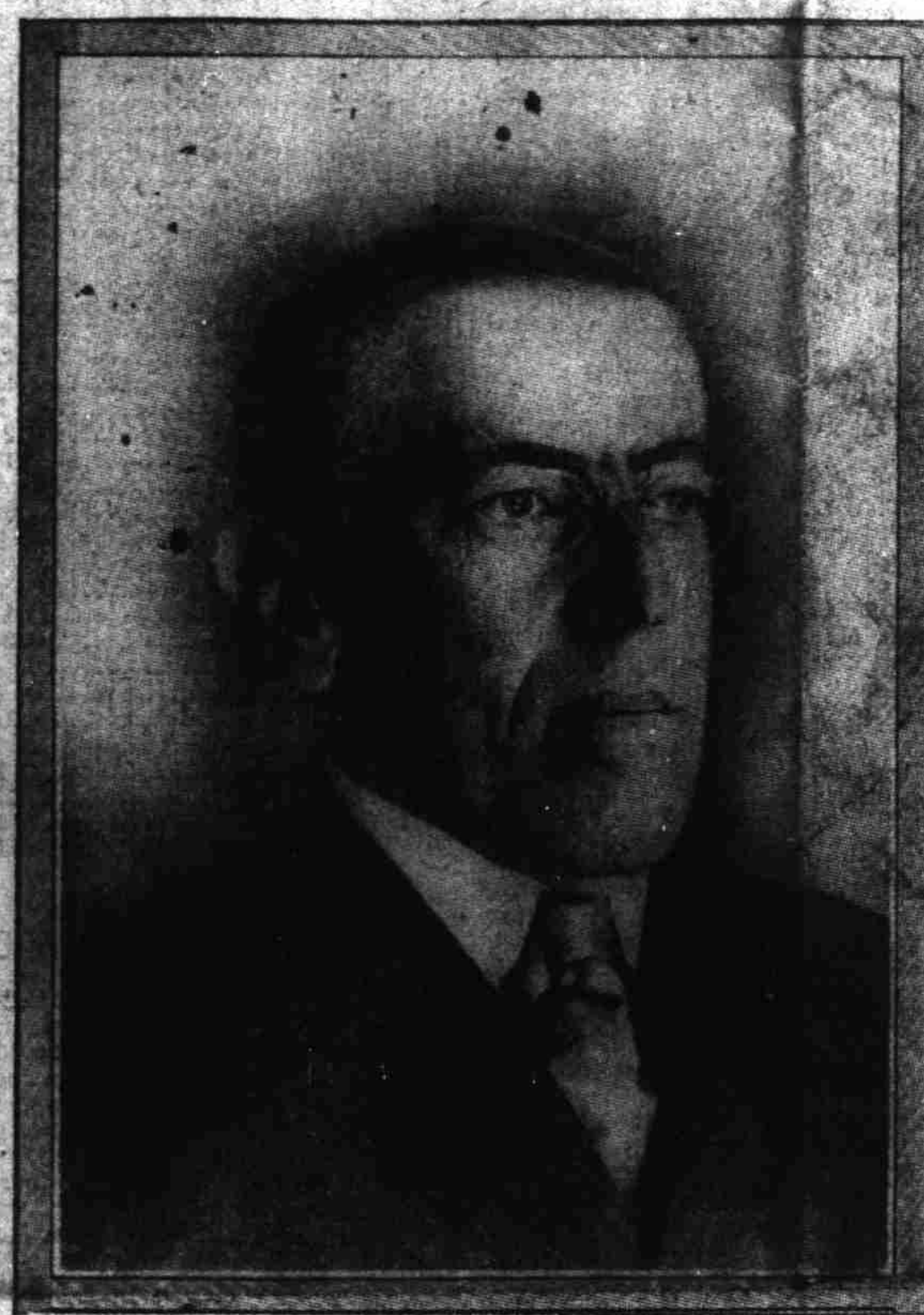
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 5.—One hundred and eighteen of 455 Los Angeles precincts return Wilson 70,057, Roosevelt 65,041, Debs 1387, Taft 197.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 5.—At 11 o'clock Republican State Chairman Goodrich conceded Indiana to the Democrats by 10,000.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 5.—At 11 o'clock Governor Wilson leads Taft in his home city by about 1,000 votes. The vote is about one-third counted.

LINCOLN, Neb.—Bryan has sent a telegram to Wilson: "I most heartily will prove a blessing to the nation upon election. I am sure your electricity congratulate you and the country and a source of strength to our party."

NEW YORK, N. Y., NOV. 5.—ELECTION OF WILSON MADE CERTAIN AT NINE-THIRTY O'CLOCK, WHEN RETURNS FROM TWENTY STATES GAVE HIM A MAJORITY IN THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 5.—Roosevelt is leading in the count, which is still incomplete. Four hundred and twenty-nine precincts give Roosevelt 40,000, Wilson 36,269, Taft 21,498, and Debs 15,271.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Nov. 5.—Early returns show that Wilson has carried Texas by a large plurality, with Roosevelt second in the race. The figures obtainable give the state to the Democratic nominee by two hundred and twenty-five thousand.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 5.—At 7 o'clock this evening indications are that Wilson carried Massachusetts by 60,000. Governor Foss has swept all before him, securing re-election by at least 70,000.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Mr. George W. Perkins and Senator Dixon concede all the eastern states to Wilson. Their only hope for Colonel Roosevelt now lies in a landslide for him in the middle west.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., NOV. 5.—Polls close at six p.m. in California. Vote reported heavy. Women turned out very strongly for Roosevelt in Los Angeles. Wilson polls strongly in San Francisco and Alameda county.

SACRAMENTO, Cal.—Wilson and Roosevelt neck and neck, Wilson likely to carry city.

BOSTON, Mass.—Wilson is running strong with Taft second and Roosevelt third.

DETROIT, Mich.—Early indications point to Wilson carrying Michigan, although returns slow.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Nov. 5.—Ten precincts city and county: Wilson 1073, Taft 603, Roosevelt 750.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 5.—296 precincts in Chicago: Deneen 18,983, Dunne 34,638, Funk 17,111.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Wilson has carried the entire East and South.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 5.—Returns from three precincts show that Wilson is running 10 to 7 ahead of Roosevelt.

SPLIT TICKET ON HAWAII IS IN PROSPECT

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence)

HILO, Nov. 4.—There will be few walkovers in the coming election on this island, according to all predictions at the present time, though a number of the local Democrats are conceding a Republican victory in most of the Legislature offices. The chief interest comes in the fight for the sheriff's office, where both sides claim victory by a margin of but one hundred votes. For Senator everyone seems sure that Metzger will poll the highest strength while Fernandez, Republican is given second place.

David Ewaliko, who has been practically in charge of the local Democratic-Home Rule fight stated, this morning that he believed that in the first district two out of the four Republican candidates for the House would be chosen. He figures that Norman Lyman and Dr. Huddy, formerly from Kaula, will be winners together with Dr. Archer Irwin and Jim Kepoo, of the combination slate. In West Hawaii he sees three Republicans or possibly four as the best choice. Holstein is expected to lead the ticket with Kaawe and Kaupiko second and third, and M. K. Makekau in hard fight for fourth place.

Metzger is strong. For the Senate D. E. Metzger is acknowledged to be exceptionally strong on the Democratic slate, with Fernandez on the Republican side as his running mate. Baker and Beckley are considered defeated, though the former may come through stronger than has been anticipated.

DEMOCRATS DRAW FIRST BLOOD FOR PRESIDENT

New York State Giving Wilson Substantial Majority—Roosevelt And Taft Not Far Behind

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 5.—One hundred and ten out of city precincts give Roosevelt 9409, Wilson 8621, and Taft 3425. It is estimated that Roosevelt will carry this city by 15,000 plurality. Edward F. Dunne, Democratic candidate for governor, is defeating Gov. Charles S. Deneen, Republican, by 45,000.

Eleven country precincts of Illinois give Wilson 897, Taft 722, Roosevelt 1499.

NEW YORK CITY, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Early election returns show Wilson leading, but these returns cannot be taken as final indication of his ultimate victory.

NEW YORK CITY, N. Y., Nov. 5.—One hundred and thirty New York state districts give Wilson 21,617, Roosevelt 10,268 and Taft 8174.

ROOSEVELT SHOWS STRONG IN VERMONT; IS LEADING

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vermont, Nov. 5.—Forty townships out of 246 give Roosevelt 3089, Taft 2781, Wilson 1616.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 5.—It is estimated here that Wilson has carried the State of Maryland by 40,000.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 5.—"Boss" Barnes, the Republican manager, has conceded that Wilson will carry the State of New York by from 100,000 to 150,000. Straus, the Bull Moose candidate for Governor, is running third.

NEW YORK, N. Y. William M. McCombs, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, telegraphs that Wilson has carried Massachusetts by 60,000 and Minnesota by 25,000.

ROME, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Complete returns from this town given in the gubernatorial election, give William Sulzer, Democrat, 1819, Job Hedges, Republican, 1352, and Oscar S. Strain Bull Moose, 1051. The same town in 1910 gave Dix, Democrat, 1996; Stimson, Republican, 1722.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Fifty-four districts out of 98 give Wilson 7282, Taft 6967, Roosevelt 5750.

BALTIMORE, Md., November 5.—The first two precincts counted here give Taft 74, Wilson 305, Roosevelt 157. The same precincts in 1908 gave Taft 341, Bryan 264.

BUFFALO, N. Y., November 5.—Complete returns here on the presidential election give Wilson 24,298, Roosevelt 19,357, Taft 13,268.

BOSTON, Mass., November 5.—Eighty city precincts give Wilson 13,075, Roosevelt 6,441, Taft 6212.

ATLANTA, Ga., November 5.—Georgia has gone overwhelmingly for Wilson.

DENVER, Col.—Wilson has carried Colorado by a plurality of 35,000 with Ammons on the ticket running with him. Moose leaders concede Roosevelt's defeat in the nation, though they claim he will carry Colorado. In complete returns give Wilson the following states: New York, Maine, Georgia, Indiana, Massachusetts, North Dakota, Maryland, Tennessee, Connecticut, Kentucky, South Carolina, Delaware, Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Texas, Missouri, Montana, New Hampshire, Colorado.

European Powers Lining Up

LONDON, England, November 5.—The British foreign secretary today declared that Great Britain is indisposed to dispute the rights of the Balkan states to formulate their own peace terms.

VIENNA, Austria, November 5.—An alignment of the Powers is evident as a result of the Balkan war. Great Britain, France and Russia will take one side, with Germany, Italy and Austria the other. Austria fears that the Allies will establish a path to the Aegean sea, which she wishes for herself.

ADRIANOPLE, Turkey, November 5.—The Bulgarian troops are being rushed on toward Constantinople, with the Servians reinforcing the siege.

BOSPHORUS, Turkey, Nov. 5.—The Bulgarian troops have cut the aqueduct and isolated the Turkish troops occupying the last line of fortifications.
