DEMOCRATS REJOICE IN BIGGEST VICTORY IN HISTORY OF PARTY HERE

REPUBLICANS GET ONE SUPERVISOR, TWO HOUSE

Delegate's Heavy Vote On Outside Islands Gives Him Approximately 1100 Majority—Split-Ticket Voting Loses Against Straight-Ticket Democracy

MUCH PATRONAGE ON ISLANDS FOR DEMOCRACY NOW

The Democratic landslide will prove epoch-making for the islands as much or even more than in the states, as shown by the fact that it is the first time in the history of the Territory an entirely new administration is to come into public office. The political patronage, heretofore held by the Republicans, becomes the Democratic pork barrel, and a large, fat juicy one it is expected to prove, full of a lot of exceedingly good things in the way of official salaries and honors.

Perhaps the foremost of these, in point of prominence, is that of the Governor. While Governor Frear declines as yet to make a statement

to his possible future action, it is generally thought President Taft will forget his promise to make the reappointment. Frear already has held over a year beyond the expiration of his term, and it is believed time-honored customs will be followed; that

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 6.—Governor Stanford Wilson will get between 285 and 300 votes in the electoral college, according to the reports who are figuring on the returns of yesterday's election.
Although Wilson was a sure winner early but some reports were issued by both Republicans and Progressives which led to the belief that more than half finished the counting returns that he had lost.
The Progressive officials in still in doubt with the reports being only favoring Wilson.
