FREAR WILL URGE IT IN MESSAGE

Says Present System Lacks Coordination and Efficiency

TEDDY AHEAD; 16 PRECINCTS NOW MISSING

SPANISH PREMIER SLAIN BY FANATICAL ANARCHIST

Assassin Shoots Prime Minister Twice Then Turns Smoking Revolver Upon Himself—Believed Dying

Madrid, Spain, November 12.—The Premier, Juan Canalejas, was shot and fatally killed this morning, by an anarchist, who fired two shots at the Premier when he was entering the palace of the Cortes.

Canalejas had been one of the most popular statesmen of the present regime. He had been Premier since April, 1910. He had been present with the preceding ministry. In April, 1911, the noted Ferrer case caused the downfall of the ministry for a second time, it being alleged that the Premier had been indiscreetly defended by the prime minister during the later debate over the legal procedure against Ferrer, who was accused of sedition.

ONE DEAD AND TWO WOUNDED IN KNIFE FAY

HILO, Hawaii, Nov. 11.—A serious cutting and shooting affray took place on Sunday night at Papakoua, which resulted in the death of one Filipino and the wounding of two more. One of the victims was a woman, shot through the groin. She is in a serious condition. A jealous Filipino climbed in the window of a shack in which a number of Filipinos were sleeping and attacked a man and a woman who were among the occupants. The woman was shot before the real fight began, and her companion started for the assault with a knife which he used to such advantage that death resulted the next morning.
