KING'S DAUGHTERS' HOME FUND SLOWLY GROWING The campaign for subscriptions for the building fund which is now being carried on by the King's Daughters for their new home in Kalihi is progressing slowly. It is believed that by Thanksgiving the necessary money will have been obtained and that the construction will start soon after that day.

The society has \$20,000 in the treasury, raised before the campaign started, but it was found that this sum would have to be increased to \$75,000, the amount needed to put up the new home. While patterned somewhat after the plans of the Y. M. C. A. the campaign is not being carried on in exactly the same manner. Each member of the organization has a list of some twenty names of different people to visit, and as these visits are made, and subscriptions secured, the lists are revised and new names added.

GO SLOWLY WITH CHARTER REVISION "I have not given the question much thought," said Supervisor Murray today when asked if he had any views on the proposition of a new municipal charter. "In my opinion, however, it would be unwise to upset the present system altogether. I believe in going slowly in amendment of the charter.

"I think that there might be a consolidation of some of the clerical work, not alone for the sake of economy but for securing greater efficiency. Also I am rather inclined to favor the payment of salaries to supervisors such as would enable them to take charge of departments of the government, giving their whole time to the duties of the office. NEW WIRELESS FOR KAUAI OPEN

LILUÉ, Kauai, Nov. 5.—Engineer L. W. Branch of the Mutual Telephone Co.'s Wireless Telegraph Department was wearing a broad smile yesterday morning. When asked why he appeared so happy he was informed that the first wireless telegram had been sent and received at the new station at Lilué, which Mr. Branch has just completed for his company.

The work of installation and completion Sunday afternoon and Sunday morning (Nov. 4) to the highest pitch of efficiency. Sunday evening promptly at eight-thirty o'clock the generator was started up and the call, "Ho, 'Ho, 'Ho" (which is the call of the Kahuku station on Oahu) was given and as quick as thought the operator at Kahuku came back with the red news that he heard the Lilué station and that the signals came loud and strong. Mr. Branch then sent a telegram to Manager J. A. Bales in Honolulu informing him that the new station was ready for business. It less than fifteen minutes he received an answer and congratulatory message from Manager Bales. Thus a wireless station that the people of Kauai can feel proud to have at their service was placed in commission, and in a few days the old station at Naselle will be dismantled and all the wireless business will be handled from the Lilué station.

The new station is of three kilowatt capacity with a transmission radius of about 1000 miles and a receiving radius of about 2000 miles. The instruments are all the very latest production of Marconi's factory and every piece of material that was used in the construction of the station is the very latest and best that could be obtained.

At the present time the power will be generated at the station by a gasoline power plant but as soon as the new power plant completed at Lilué, electric current will be purchased from the local concern.

Many people will be interested to know that there are 5 wireless telegraph stations west of the Rocky Mountains that is up-to-date and complete in every way as the station at Lilué, and all those who feel interested will be glad shown through the whole plant at any time and visitors are always welcome.

The station will open all night tonight to receive and maintain election returns. Mr. H. Vincent will be the operator in charge of the station and as soon as the work of dismantling the old Naselle station is finished Mr. Branch will go immediately to Lahaina, Maui, where he will install a plant similar to the one here.

CHEMICAL EXTINGUISHER NOT SUFFICIENT.
