LINK'S DEFEAT A MOST COSTLY ONE

It cost Delegate Kubio \$261.50 to obtain his re-election, while L. L. McCandless spent \$4,706.49 in his futile effort to defeat the Delegate. These are the figures placed on file at the Territorial Secretary's office, showing the campaign expense incurred by the leading candidates for this office. It is understood Kalamannole's campaign actually cost much more than the amount he sets forth as his own expense. R. W. Shingle being quoted a few days ago as saying that the Republican Territorial central committee donated \$1000 to aid his cause.

McCandless' statement, itemized, is as follows: Nomination fee, \$25; wireless messages, \$48.50; traveling expense \$1424.50; personal expense \$175; helpers and clerical expense, \$327.50; public meetings, \$275.00; and postage, \$11.50.

Kubio's expenses are detailed as follows: Nomination fee, \$25; personal expenses, \$141.50; printing and advertising, \$5; stationery, postage, rent salaries, public meetings, etc., \$90.

Joel C. Cohen, who ran as independent candidate for the Senate and has since joined the Democratic party, itemizes his expense as follows: Newspaper advertising, \$773.30; nomination fee, \$25; expense of meetings, \$147; auto hire, \$43.30; bill posting, \$45; personal and traveling expense, \$241.50—a total of \$1519.25.

Norman Watkins, elected to the House of Representatives from this island, spent \$307.75, divided as follows: Nomination fee, \$25; personal expenses, \$40; printing and advertising, \$23.75.

A. E. Kalamannole, candidate for Senator, spent a total of \$530.00 of this amount \$250 being for personal expense, \$21 for printing and advertising and \$255 for the nomination fee.

James H. Boyd, candidate for the House, spent \$115; spending \$82.50 for printing and advertising, \$25 for personal expense and \$7 for the nomination fee. Thomas D. Ah Leong, candidate for the House, spent a total of \$44.25, and the Hon. J. K. Kono, also a candidate for the House, spent \$55.

MAGAZINE WILL TELL OF BEAUTY OF HAWAII

With a view to bringing out an article on the Hawaiian Islands in a future number of "Travel," Robert S. Lemmon, associate editor of that magazine, has written to Secretary Wood of the promotion committee asking for more information and thanking him for the Hawaiian pictures which he had sent to E. K. Gillott, advertising manager of the magazine.

"I feel quite sure," writes Mr. Lemmon, "that when we come to bring out the Honolulu article about which Mr. Gillott writes you, that some of your photographs will come in nicely for illustration. If it is agreeable, I would like to hold them here for a time."

Zeno K. Myers writes from San Francisco that the advertising of the coming Floral parade and Carnival in that city is going along at a great rate. He has succeeded in securing a good deal of publicity through the medium of the press, and in a very short time some of the papers will print a few feature stories, illustrated with different scenes from the Islands.

Literature of Hawaii is being distributed in every place where it will do the most good. Mr. Myers says in his letter that Roy M. Francis the bird man, wishes to come to Hawaii during the carnival and give a few exhibitions. His proposition, says Myers, is "no fly, no pay."

FAVOR M'CANDLESS

Dispatches from Hilo declare that the Bourbons of the Big Island are opposed to Mr. Waller's candidacy for the governorship, and are inclined to favor Link McCandless. Their ground for the objection to Waller is that he is "too much like Frear," while they assert that they believe Link would give them and the Territory a more energetic administration. Among those who have come to the front with their opinions are such men as Harry Irwin, who declares that he will not run against Link, Campaign Manager, McGuire, David Tawaliko, the labor leader and supervisor-elect, Dr. Archer Irwin, and H. D. Corbett.

Mr. Cheatham has made a thorough study of this new law with a view to learning its particular application to Honolulu and Hawaii. His talk will be illustrated by a map showing the zones provided by the law and the charges for sending packages through the mails.

This talk will be given at the weekly luncheon of the Honolulu Ad Club held in the upper restaurant of the Palm Cafe.

A general invitation is extended to businessmen of the city who are interested in the operation of this law to attend. The lunch starts promptly at 12 o'clock and the lunch-hour talk at 12:30. Following the talk a general discussion is invited.

COMMUNITY EXTENSION WORK AT Y. M. C. A.

W. G. Hall, manager of the Cotton-Well Company, led the third of the week-of-prayer meetings at the Y. M. C. A. this noon, and spoke upon the subject of "Community Extension Work."

Community extension work is a term applied to that new form of religious work which the Young Men's Christian Association has demonstrated during the past few years, expressed in such plans as noon-day meetings, in shops and factories, and Bible classes in various parts of the city outside the association building.

Meetings in recent years have been held in many novel places and it is astonishing the extent to which these meetings have appealed to men. A hundred men will pay close attention to a straight gospel talk, given on the floor of their own shop, whom you could not get to church in an automobile.

Community extension based on the philosophy that if the mountain will not come to Mohammed, Mohammed will go to the mountain. Under the direction of the Y. M. C. A. last year, 181 different associations in the United States and Canada conducted 14,938 such meetings, with a total attendance of 1,194,733 men.

These meetings were held in shops, factories, car barns, school houses, fire stations, hotel lobbies, streets, and a wide variety of places; in fact any where a group of men were together long enough to give fifteen minutes' attention to some songs and a short address. Meetings of this kind have been held in the Honolulu Iron Works shops, Cotton-Well's shops, the Rapid Transit car barn, Oahu Prison, and at the various military posts with excellent results.

The Men and Religion campaign has one committee, the community extension committee, promoting this work, of which W. G. Hall, who led the meeting this noon, is chairman.

Y. M. C. A. ADMITS MANY NEW MEMBERS

The membership committee of the Young Men's Christian Association met at twelve-thirty today and favorably passed on the names of seventy-two applications for membership to the association, 51 men and 21 boys having applied since the last meeting of the committee on October 19.

Chairman Ed. Touse read an encouraging report for the month of October, showing a growth of from 1124 members on October 1 to 1171 on October 31. In the boys' department the membership has increased in that time from 243 to 263. The Seniors grew from 394 to 417, and the business men's department from 32 to 31.

Plans were discussed for increasing the membership of the association steadily throughout the coming year in order to reach, by the first of next May, a goal of over 1200 members. An effort will also be made to increase the membership of the Japanese association to 200, making a grand total of 1500 members of the Y. M. C. A. in Honolulu.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12.—Bound for Portland from Rio de Janeiro to load wheat, the German ship, Terpsichore, put into Port Stanley, Faulkland Islands, October 6, because of the illness of Captain Noretka. A message to that effect was received by the Merchants' exchange. The vessel is under charter to M. H. Houser, and sailed from Rio de Janeiro, August 16. It is her first voyage to Portland.
