WILSON, TAFT AND ROOSEVELT IN THE AFTERMATH

Weeks of Election on the Three Big National Parties of the United States

WASHINGTON, N. D., Nov. 6.—President Wilson turned away from the wreckage of the campaign and the wreckage of his own party for two days today and went for a brief trip to the mountains.

continue to exist; that it will be active as in the past, and that there is no reason to believe that his chances of future success were not excellent.

Wilson, apparently was enjoying life thoroughly today. Colonel Roosevelt said he wanted to fall his supporters everywhere and he thinks of the outcome and the outlook.

When I have all the facts accurately I shall make a statement, he said.

The only thing which was accepted as a settled fact at Sagamore Hill today was that the fight was to go on.

What methods Colonel Roosevelt will adopt are unknown even to himself.

Of course, the fight will go on, he said with an air of finality.

China friends of Colonel Roosevelt said he was not surprised at Governor Wilson's election because he was at no time confident, they asserted, that the new party would be able to win its first fight.

Several Progressive leaders came to Oyster Bay to talk over the election and plans for the future.

Neither Colonel Roosevelt nor his visitors would discuss their plans. When he goes to his editorial office in New York Friday, Colonel Roosevelt will hold another conference at which definite arrangements for keeping up the Progressive organization may be made.

It is Colonel Roosevelt's desire to have a vacation from politics after three years have been decided, although he expects to keep constantly in touch with the general aspects of the situation.

It is hoped to carry forward some kind of Progressive propaganda throughout the next two years, with an eye to the Congressional and State elections in 1914.

Colonel Roosevelt expects to drop back for the winter into the quiet life at home which he led before the campaign, with a trip to New York once or twice a week.

NET RESULTS OF NATIONAL ELECTION STAGGERS WINNERS

Not Even Most Sanguine of the Democrats Expected Such Countrywide Sweep

The net results of the general election held on Nov. 5 were staggering even to the most sanguine of Democrats. They included:

The election of Wilson and Marshall, the Democratic candidates for president and vice president, by the largest electoral majority ever returned.

An assured majority of the United States senate coincident with the inauguration of President-elect Wilson.

A majority of 149 in the next house of representatives.

Election of 19 Democratic governors to replace Republicans.

Socialist Vote Increases.

An increase in the Socialist vote, which may approach the 700,000 mark, the total in New York city alone reaching \$3,433 and 160,000 in Illinois.

The President ran ahead of the column in Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

The election of 19 Democratic governors to replace Republicans.

The majority of Wilson over both Taft and Roosevelt is the largest ever given a president.

Roosevelt had a majority over Parker of 196 votes. In 1908 Taft's majority over Bryan was 159.

The number of states carried by Wilson—39—is the largest number ever carried by a candidate for the presidency.

Only once before in the history of the country has a president ever carried so large a proportion of states.

The victory of the Democratic national candidates was so complete that there was really more interest in the division of the Republican vote between Taft and Roosevelt than as to the exact size of Wilson's plurality over either in states where one or the other polled the largest per cent of the vote.

LOCAL AND GENERAL

The Federal grand jury today called to meet Monday morning the first case in an action to nullify the law of the United States.

A letter from the State Department to the Governor arriving on the 6th, the British Ambassador at Honolulu, U. S. C. stating that the British Government will visit Honolulu, Sept. 10 and 11 and Hawaii April 10 and 11.

At the meeting of the board of health yesterday afternoon, physicians licenses were recommended to the following applicants, who have passed the examination and taken in practice here: Dr. Carl Kahan, Dr. A. R. Thomas, Dr. A. P. Jackson and Dr. J. A. Lyman.

Governor Foster received a communication in the morning mail today from the mainland asking him to appoint delegates from the Territory to the conference of the American Society for the Judicial Settlement of International Disputes.

Word was received by the Japanese consul here yesterday that Gen. Tai Chong, the Chinese man who was on a charge of embezzlement, has been placed under arrest by the authorities at Tokin.

U. S. Commissioner C. B. Davis this morning issued a warrant for the arrest of a watchman who has been employed at Schofield Barracks and is accused of burglarizing one of the buildings there.

It is reported that Absalom, Honolulu's house dog, is dead. Rumor says his demise was a public spectacle, occurring on the grounds of the square just across the street from the Young Hotel Thursday afternoon.

It is reported that Chinese officials are on their way to the United States to borrow money for conducting government enterprises.

Flower women are to be barred from the Paris streets. The florists complain that the street stalls interfere with their business.
