Soloist for Symphony Orchestra concert Tuesday night

FIFTH AN unusually attractive program and bringing forward as a soloist a young soprano whose musical education has been received in Hawaii, the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra Society will give its opening concert at the opera house next Tuesday night at the Hawaiian Opera House.

The program was announced today by President W. A. Love, and includes three numbers by Mrs. Charles L. Hall, the young soloist who is to make her appearance with the symphony orchestra. Beethoven's "Pastorale," Mozart's "Le Nozze di Figaro" and Schubert's "The Trout" are the three compositions represented on the program.

This concert is the second given by the orchestra since its revival a year ago. The first concert was a surprising success artistically, the organization showing good musical capacity, and did fairly well financially. The society expects a large attendance on Tuesday night.
