'HOUSEMOTHER' FOR SEMINARY

Miss E. A. Calvert Arrives to Take Up Duties at Maunalo

WAILUKU, Maui, Nov. 16.—Miss E. A. Calvert, the house mother for Maunalo arrived on the last boat from the Coast and came to Maui today by the Claudine. This is a new position at the Seminary created by a friend in order that the teachers might be relieved from so long hours on duty. The new position means what it implies, namely, the entire care of the children as a mother in a home would care for her own children. The trustees and teachers are very much pleased that such a position has been created, and they believe they have been exceedingly fortunate in the selection of Miss Calvert.

The entrance to the Seminary grounds has been vastly improved during the last two or three months. The drive begins at the point where formerly it left the Māhāwao road, but instead of coming directly to the Seminary and therefore taking a very sharp grade, the road now turns a

little to the left, going first toward the reservoir and then on an easy grade entering the grounds at the left of the building. It is the plan of the Principal, Miss Eva L. Heuser, to make the entrance beautiful with well planned shrubbery. The old fence has been repaired.

The new electric lighting plant for Maui Agriculture company will supply the Seminary with electric lights. The wiring will be begun soon. The electric fixtures are being picked out now, so that in a few months when the new plant is in running order, the whole of the institution will be as well lighted as any building in the Territory. The girls now made use of by the Maui Agricultural company for their plant belongs to the Seminary. In lieu of using it for the new purpose the Sugar company has arranged to give the Seminary electric lights.

MISS DE FOREST TALKS ON JAPAN

Noted College Woman Delivers Address at Central Union on Mission Work

Choosing as her subject "Christian Education in Japan," Miss Charlotte De Forest gave an interesting talk at Central Union Church last night; here a large crowd had gathered to listen to the address and to hear the sacred music, which is the second series to be given this year. Miss De Forest, who is a teacher in the Girl's School in Kobe, Japan, is not unknown in Honolulu, as her father visited the Islands several years ago enroute to Japan to engage in missionary work. After his death last year a memorial church was erected in his honor. She is on her way to the Orient to resume her duties after a year's leave of absence in the States.

Following a brief outline as to the methods of Christian education in the Japanese and the ways in which the Japanese children are being taught the Christian faith, Miss De Forest explained that the systems used in that country for the development of morals and manners were probably better than those in use in the English schools; for in Japan they begin at the age of six years, when the child enters school. Good citizenship, generosity, helpfulness, and like subjects are given to the small students for study each day, and, with the help of a chart and blackboard, and with donations by the students themselves, these subjects make a firm impression on the minds of the children.

The teaching of the English language, said Miss De Forest, is a most important factor. She also stated that in nearly every case she found the pupils willing to study it. They have found out that it is the key to a wonderful literature, and Charles Dickens' works and other books along that line are now being read with great interest by the girls of her school. After mastering the English language, it is easy for them to understand the Bible, and they are quick to grasp its teachings. Miss De Forest said that the singing of hymns has accomplished a great deal for Christianity, as the Japanese have a great attraction for them. Together with these hymns and the teaching of the children, they slowly but surely acquire a knowledge of Christianity that will be an everlasting help to them.
