

### PLAIN WORDS AT MEETING ON EUGENICS

Rev. Robert E. Smith Declares Pulpit Has Been Too Prudish in Policy

"The pulpit has been too prudish in its treatment of these subjects. The state should make it mandatory for every couple seeking marriage to present to the officiating clergyman a clean bill of physical and mental health signed by a reputable physician."

Such was the declaration of Rev. Robert E. Smith, pastor of the Methodist church, before the men and women who crowded Cooke Hall, Y. M. C. A. building, last night at the conference on eugenics.

Called by Ulrich Thompson of Kamehameha schools, the conference gathered together scores of prominent educators, clergymen, businessmen, and others interested in charitable, benevolent or settlement work in this city. It was a decidedly earnest gathering, and the spirit of energy to take up problems of race betterment was reflected in the score of papers read by their authors. The papers were five minutes long, and at the conclusion of the program Judge Sanford B. Dole, who presided, complimented the authors on the fact that each paper in so brief a time had said something and said something constructive.

Action was taken by those at the meeting to begin a campaign of public education on the subject of race-culture. Judge Dole, on suggestion of Mr. Thompson afterward put, in the form of a motion, named Dr. W. D. Hobdy as chairman of a committee of five to receive papers and to arrange for material that can be used from the pulpit, through the press and in other ways of public communication.

Mr. Thompson opened the meeting, after a few introductory remarks by Judge Dole, with a paper emphasizing the importance of eugenics in helping solve the problem of staying race degeneracy and furthering race-culture—"The National Problem." The other papers followed in rapid succession. Eugenics from widely varying standpoints, as well as statements of the local conditions and the necessity for action, were submitted by the following:

### STOCKS GOING OVER A PALL

Sugar stocks are cascading. Prices are not merely down but falling off in value. A month ago, depressed as the market was then, prediction that Wai'alea would go to par this year would have been ridiculed. Par was struck yesterday by Wai'alea, and today it is one and a half points below. Oahu, active two days ago at 25, fell off a quarter yesterday, and today is down an additional three-quarters. McBryde and Olae, which long ago shed the bloom of their gain in the boom of some months ago, each show a loss of half a point and it is a moot question how near these stocks will go to the edge of being given away.

Other than sugars are apparently not affected much by the depression in them—perhaps they are the gainers thereby. Telephone shows an advance of one and a half points. Pineapple is weaker than at last sale. Other industrial and transportation stocks are held at last sale quotations or higher. Bonds of the two water companies are active at premiums, a value of \$50,000 in them changing hands today.

### TROUBLE FACED BY OIL MEN

San Francisco Examiner, Nov. 4: A preliminary organization of an oil producers' market association was effected in Bakersfield last week at a meeting of the representatives of nearly seven oil companies affected by the recent announcement of the Standard Oil Company that it would take no more oil under 18 gravity when the present contracts expire. A committee consisting of Timothy McCall, D. A. Barlow, T. H. Minor, E. P. Gullerson and B. A. Castro was appointed to perfect a plan of organization and to interview the Standard Oil Company, the Associated Oil Company, the Union Oil Company and the Independent Oil Producers' Agency in regard to the disposal of the product

and to report at a meeting Saturday in Bakersfield. A grave question was before the meeting, that of shutting down the properties until a satisfactory price was obtained. Spillacy of Los Angeles has already closed down two of the properties in the Midway in which he is interested, the Mascot and the Crossus, and declares he will not resume operations until a better price is obtained.

The oilmen agree that 30 cents is no price for oil, and that at 50 cents a barrel fuel oil is still cheap enough. Some of the companies cannot produce at a profit by selling at 30 cents.

What action is to be taken will be determined at the next meeting after the committee has interviewed the different marketing companies.

The matter of a shut-down is a very serious one. About thirty or forty companies would be affected, and this would mean the throwing out of employment of several hundred workers. Then, again, the companies are operating under leases of different nature. Some of the terms make

drilling and producing compulsory; some companies have to produce to keep the water from flooding the oil strata, and some are not financially able to shut down. All of these phases must be considered and the committee will go into the matter thoroughly before making any recommendations.

### BUSINESS ITEMS

Stocks in New York yesterday were affected by the expectation of United States supreme court decisions in cases dealing with trusts. The market was dull in the morning and irregular in the afternoon, it having been announced at midday that the supreme court would adjourn for a fortnight after that day's session, and trading was at a standstill in the closing hour.

Closing prices in San Francisco yesterday were as follows: Hawaiian Commercial, 40 asked; Hawaiian Sugar, 37 bid, 33 asked; Honokaa, 10 bid; Hutchinson, 18.50 asked; Kilauea, 12 bid; Onomea, 24 bid, 24.50 asked; Pihouha, 20.50 asked. Unlisted: Honolulu Plantation, 33.50 bid—50 sold at 34.

It has been decided in Washington that Hawaiian bonds will be accepted as security for postal deposits at their market value, not to exceed par value.

Raw sugar was steady in New York yesterday, and 96 test centrifugals still at 4.05. Refined quiet.
