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HIRAM JOHNSON BOTH GAINS AND LOSES STRENGTH

National Reputation Increases, but He Falls Behind in His Own State

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 9. — "It's been a big victory for Governor Johnson even if the Bull Moose didn't get to the feed trough," said a wise politician the other day after the election returns.

It seemed so. Like many another westerner, the fighting governor went east and got a reputation, which cannot help but be of personal benefit to him in the future, though it is evident from the election returns in California that he lost much esteem in his native state, yet he may have gained a national reputation.

While the Johnson forces in the past have won by thousands of votes, their lead was so cut down in the national election that at this writing four days after the polls closed, no one yet knows who carried California. The fight in this state was bitter—more so than in the old-time stand against the Southern Pacific. The Progressive move which disfranchised the Taft Republicans in the state was bitterly resented by the Taft supporters and by all who wanted to see fair play, and this undoubtedly cost Johnson and Roosevelt many votes. For these men combined with the Democrats to give Wilson a tremendous vote.

Bitter Fight on Johnson. Johnson has spent many weeks away from the state, a situation resented by his supporters, who say California can well afford to pay the salary of its first citizen, the only one ever in a national office race, and who is giving the state great advertising. His enemies say he is a thief to accept pay from the state and spend weeks away in a personal campaign. "Johnson, the man who threw down San Francisco," is a slogan beginning to be used against him because he denounced the exposition expenditures and the expositions' officials in an effort to prevent them from doing politics. Undoubtedly that drew votes from Johnson in the north, but it ought to add to his popularity in the south, particularly in Los Angeles, where jealousy of San Francisco is quite apparent.

This jealousy was never better shown than in the recent election when a vote was called upon an amendment to the constitution, which if passed would have enabled San Francisco to enlarge by taking in surrounding communities, providing the latter were willing. A statement was mailed to every voter in Los Angeles, according to report, demanding that the vote be against the amendment so that San Francisco would not be able to grow by extending its limits. No dirtier piece of politics has been done in years in California, but it is not presumed that the better business elements in either city would countenance such tactics.

"Swelled Head" Charged. Johnson is on his way home now to take up his work again. There is no question but that he has fathered some mighty good laws for the benefit of all the people, and should be given full credit, but as one man put it, "While he was one of us he helped all of us, but since his head swelled he is using us as a stepping-stone to advance himself."

An appealing argument to be sure, but there are very few who have achieved great prominence who haven't done that very thing, so Johnson is not to be particularly blamed for that.

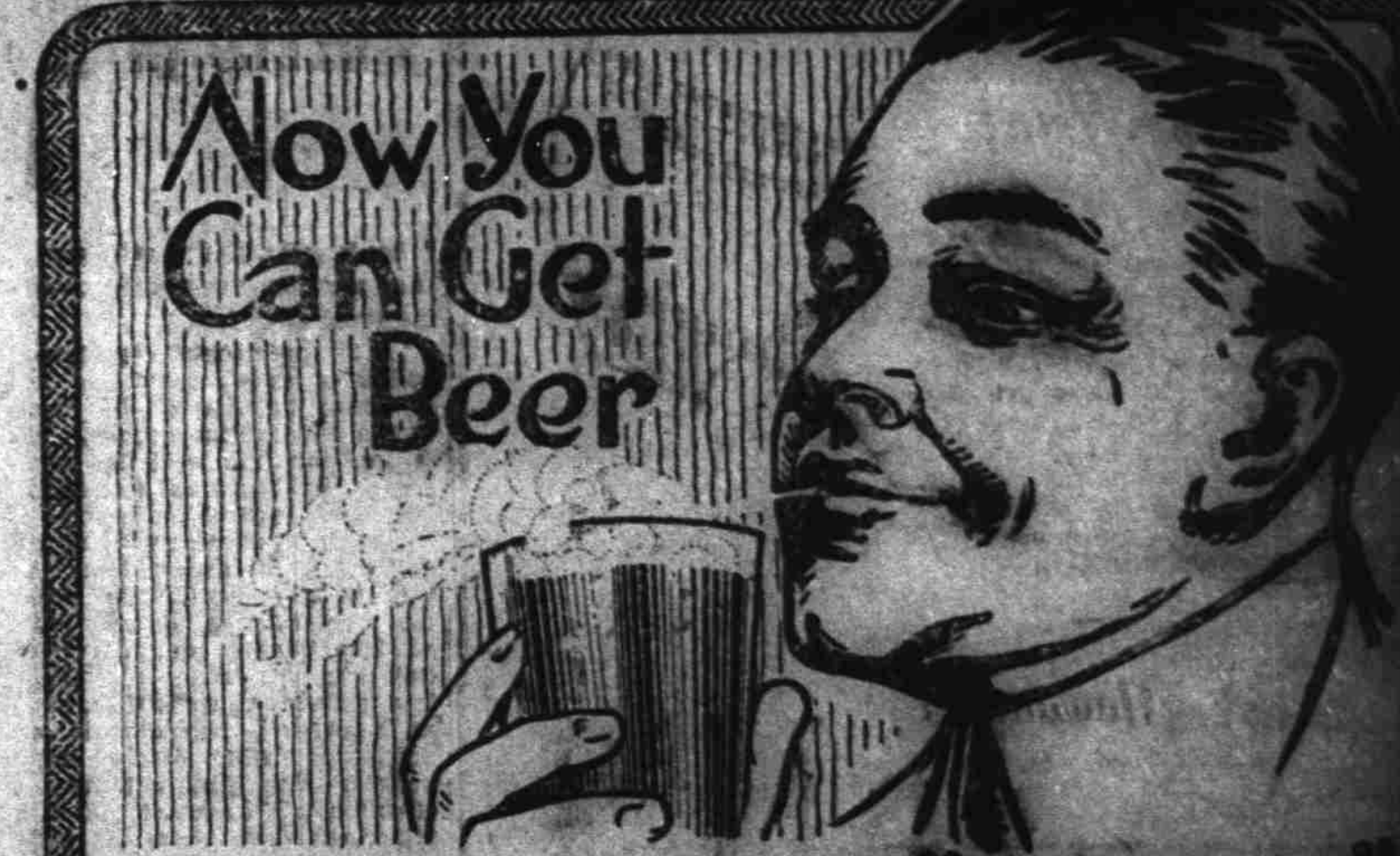
Being a comparative newcomer in the political game he lacks the sustained poise of the older "wiseacres," and as a consequence has "run away with himself." He has built up how ever as good a machine as the Southern Pacific ever had, but with no tried and seasoned hand at the tiller of the Progressive ship of state, the California organization is more than likely to go upon the rocks if the same political course is sailed.

Progressives To Go Ahead. Whether the final count shows Wilson or Roosevelt in the lead the Progressive forces will go right ahead perfecting plans to get even a firmer grip on the state legislature two years hence. They have a good chance to do it, unless the Taft or old Republicans continue to support the Democratic cause, which necessarily they don't want to do indefinitely. But the hatred Johnson has engendered in many old friends by his high handed tactics will lead to the forming of a strong efficient and continued opposition.

It is a notable fact that Johnson has lost more friends from among the capitalists than from the labor ranks. Big Business doesn't care much what a man does so long as it has strings on him, but it is an unforgivable thing to throw off all the strings, run some of your own, and then go to the plain votes to be sustained.

There isn't a politician in California any clever than Johnson and his supporters for the time being, and they know what they want, and are going after it. Although the election is over it's a fair surmise that there will be things doing in California during the next two years, for this state is the "melting pot" of political, fads and fancies.
