## WHAT YOUNG GIRLS SHOULD WEAR IN THE FORM OF JEWELS

A few years ago when young girls first began to wear "fawry" jewelry, mothers, though they allowed it, were shocked at the evidence of such atrocious taste. A long time ago young girls wore no jewelry, and then they were allowed to wear plain gold bandings. Gradually the list of wearables increased and now a girl in her teens may wear any bit of finery she fancies.

Odd rings have been in fashion for a number of years and many girls have more than one finger ring-bedecked. Diamonds and other of the precious gems are not in good taste for the school girl, even though they are genuine stones. Large rings, too, are not particularly desirable. A pretty seal or a turquoise in a plain setting is very becoming to the young girl. A ring with two or three small pearls is pretty, too. The long ones that cover a third of one's finger are anything but things of beauty.

Years ago the heavy chain bracelets were very stylish and most every girl owned one. These flopped about and made a deal of noise whenever they happened to strike the back of a chair. The fad now of having a number of silver bracelets that tinkle at the movement of the wrist or arm is just about as bad. The old saying "children should be seen and not heard" applies to girls in their teens as well as to tiny tots, and attention attracted through the exhibition of noisy jewelry is just as bad as that called forth by loud talking. Heavy gold bracelets are not becoming to the young girl, for they make her tiny wrist look scrawny. There are so many pretty designs now that are quite suitable for the girl. There are little blocks of gold fastened together with tiny gold chains that are very attractive for one who can afford them. The silver signet bracelet is far more becoming to the school girl than the gold one.

Many of the little girls of today wear elaborate pins; no doubt these belong to mother and are just appropriate for the occasion. Plain gold pins are far more attractive and pretty for a young girl. Sometimes the pair of beauty pins may be set with tiny turquoises or pearls but any of the brilliant stones is very bad taste. The large bar pins with their fancy elaborate garnishing are not for sweet sixteen.

Every girl likes a pretty necklace. There are many dainty designs that are simple and in good taste. A dainty pendant with a semi-precious stone attached to a thin gold chain is most becoming to a young person. Coral and pearls, too, are appropriate, providing they are genuine. There are handsome chains of seed pearls that are lovely for a young girl and the dainty linked pink coral is pretty, too.

There are many imitation pearl and coral necklaces now that, though they may be pretty, are most inappropriate, and no girl with any thought for the appropriateness of things would wear one.

The ear rings made their re-appearance on the mainland about five years ago but only came to Honolulu during the last year and a half. At first they were looked upon by the young girls with something akin to horror. Later, though, when the women here adopted them, the girls waited them. Real earrings are very expensive and often the pin money will not purchase a pair, so the girls are wearing the imitation pearl earrings. These are not pretty on any one, particularly on a young girl. There are pretty gold earrings or those of turquoises and coral but even they are not becoming to anyone but a grown woman. Then, too, there are only certain types of women who can wear earrings and still appear to have character in their faces. When noticing a young girl who wore earrings, a man said recently: "There is something radically wrong with the seventeen-year-old girl who wears earrings of imitation diamonds and something equally wrong with the mother who will allow it."

Elaborate watches are not for the girl in her teens. There are so many pretty enameled ones or those of silver ornamented with pretty designs that are in good taste.

This seems to be the age of imitation jewelry. A number of the wealthy women in Eastern society wear ropes of handsome pearls which are in reality not pearls at all but merely imitations. And so it is with every kind of jewelry. Imitators are so clever that they are often able to make sales and convince people that they have bought the genuine article.

Too many jewels are not becoming to any one, and particularly unbecoming to the school girl. Every girl wants a ring, a necklace and a watch besides a number of little beauty pins, and there is no reason why she should not have them, but each ornament should be genuine and of a simple design.
