MILES REBUKED BY DEMOCRATIC PRECINCT CLUB

L. L. McCandless was given an overwhelming endorsement for governor by the Democratic club of the Tenth precinct, Fifth district, last night, and William E. Miles, county committeeman for the precinct, was given a stiff rebuke by his precinct associates. Miles, who is credited with being a strong supporter of G. J. Waller for governor, had told a number of Democratic leaders that he would speak for his precinct in endorsing Waller, according to the story told by other members of the Tenth precinct club. When the Democratic county committee met last Friday evening to discuss the gubernatorial situation, Miles, as representing the Tenth precinct, voted against McCandless.

By a resolution passed last night, the club repudiated Miles' action, and today statements were made that if he did not express the sentiments of his precinct, he would get into trouble. Miles was not present at last night's meeting, and it is said that a verbal rebuke all nicely prepared for him was not delivered because he was wise enough to stay away.

The club also decided to hold a luncheon in the near future. Thirty-six votes in favor of McCandless for governor out of thirty-six present at the meeting last night, were recorded in the vote on the foregoing resolution, which was as follows:

Whereas, at a meeting of the Democratic Territorial Central committee, held on Thursday evening, the 15th inst., said committee endorsed the Hon. L. L. McCandless for governor of the Territory of Hawaii; and

Whereas, it is the opinion of the members of the Democratic club of the Tenth precinct, Fifth district, that the Hon. L. L. McCandless is the logical Democrat for the said and responsible position of chief executive of the Territory of Hawaii, under a national Democratic administration; and

Whereas, the Hon. L. L. McCandless is independent, fearless, and highly qualified to serve the people of this territory with equal justice to all; therefore be it

Resolved, by this club, that we heartily ratify the action of the Democratic Territorial Central committee in endorsing the Hon. L. L. McCandless for governor of the Territory of Hawaii; and, be it further

Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Democratic Territorial Central committee.

It was reported this morning that some of the telephone lines down near Aiea were out of commission, but this statement was refuted by the telephone company.

Many of the streets both downtown and in the residence districts were running with water. A report by the weather bureau shows that the total precipitation from 8 o'clock last night until that time this morning was .43 inches.

SOCIETIES WANT TO USE LIBRARY ROOMS

At a meeting last evening of the board of trustees of the Library of Hawaii, the application of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution for a regular meeting place in the building was read and held for the next meeting. Letters from the Hawaiian Medical Association and the Hawaiian Engineering Society were received at the meeting, in which these two organizations offered to loan their medical library and reference books to the new library providing that none others but members of these two societies be allowed to remove the books from the library. These letters will be passed upon at the next meeting.

Plans were submitted for the library park, and these were accepted. Work will begin probably at once upon the grass planting and cement walks. A long cement walk will extend along the entire front of the new building, and the one which will give entrance to the library from King street will be broken in the center with a circle of grass and palms.
