After four hours' deliberation yesterday afternoon a jury in Circuit Judge Robinson's court returned a verdict of acquittal in the case against Seung Sang Chin and Kim Sang Yong, the young Koreans accused of kidnapping a young girl, Mary Lim. It is said the first ballot showed eleven in favor of acquittal, and that the remaining time was devoted to argument with the one juror who held out.

Official returns from the recent election show that the Oriental vote, particularly that of the Japanese, is gradually increasing. The percentage of increase in numbers, but the advance in actual numbers is not so startling. For instance, in the Second representative district on Hawaii, the increase this year over the last election was 700 per cent. This means, however, that two years ago only one Japanese cast a ballot, while seven more voted three weeks ago.

At Central Union Church next Sunday morning, Rev. R. E. King Near Fort

NO SUGAR FOR COAST STEAMERS

There is little doing in the movement of sugar from the islands to the coast these days.

The Matson Navigation steamer Lurline, now being discharged of five thousand tons general cargo will leave Honolulu on next Tuesday evening without any sugar for coast refiners.

Twenty thousand cases of preserved pineapples as well as quantities of honey, coffee and bananas will have to partially fill the capacious hold of the Lurline.

All ten freight stow far offered for stowage on the vessel will not by any number of means fill the vessel to capacity.

Between thirty and forty passengers have been booked for San Francisco. Castle & Cooke propose to dispatch the vessel for Kaohulu at a late hour Saturday evening. The liner is due to return to Honolulu at daylight Monday morning.

Several local firms are said to have presented claims against this vessel for damage done to perishable freight through what is alleged the breaking down of the refrigerating plant, on the last voyage. Several crates of poultry as well as fruits are said to have suffered because of the accident.

M. Yamashiro, Jr., a Japanese merchant accused of sweeping dirt from his store out onto the sidewalk, forfeited \$10 cash bail by his failure to appear when the case was called in Judge Robinson's court this morning. The case, an appeal from the lower court, was dismissed.

Circuit Judge Whitney, Assistant Attorney General A. G. Smith, Judge Stanley, A. D. Larnach and Attorney F. J. H. Schneck have come to Hilo where Judge Whitney is conducting a land court hearing of the Umanua and Helen K. Edmonds cases. They expect to return to Honolulu Tuesday morning. Meantime court in Judge Whitney's division is suspended though some of his trials are to be taken by Judge Robinson tomorrow. The latter has about a dozen cases to dispose of tomorrow.

As the result of the passing of a resolution condemning him for refusing to pass favorably on a resolution before the committee endorsing L. L. McCandless for the governorship, W. E. Miles, Democratic county committeeman from the tenth of the fifth, who took a prominent part in the recent campaign, is disgusted at the action of his club. Mr. Miles said that he is sore at the club for passing such a resolution and making it public, but what put him out the most was about the fact that his club would go on record over something the members knew nothing about.

Testimony brought out at the Indianapolis labor trials indicate that Olaf Tveitmo of San Francisco was the chief of the Times dynamiting crew.

Lars Anderson, now minister to Belgium, has been appointed Ambassador to Japan, to succeed Chas. Bryan, resigned.

BROKEN HEAD AT THE FEAST

A bottle that once contained the unseasonable and disturbing "dago-red" is alleged to have proved the unpleasant specter at a feast, held on last Sunday in upper Makiki, at which an Hawaiian youth was badly cut about the head, and for days received surgical treatment at the hospital.

The first fight of the afternoon of a Broadway team brought three young men to book and resulted in one of their number being sentenced to six months imprisonment at the city and county jail.

D. Kopka, J. Kaelele and Charles Tuck were arraigned before Judge Monarrat this morning upon a charge of assault and battery. Their victim with head wrapped in bandages was a spectator and later a witness against the trio.

Some conflicting testimony deduced brought about the discharge of two men, namely Kopka and Charles Tuck. Kaelele, though defended by Attorney Chillingworth failed to take the stand, declaring that he could not recall any details that led up to the alleged assault. An appeal to a higher court was noted.

Fred Holmes, suffering from a scalp wound received through falling down a flight of stairs was sent to the hospital for treatment this morning. The police allege that the man was mired under the influence of liquor when the accident occurred.

A Hawaiian game, who has frequently been invited to pay a friendly visit to police headquarters was found guilty of tussling loose two match boxes and disturbing a minimum fine was levied.

Guerrero, arraigned upon a charge of theft of one or more bicycles pleaded not guilty to the charge and his case was sent over for one week.

Through the death of Chan Hoon a Chinese inmate at the hospital the Territorial courts will take no further notice in the pressing of a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, where Judge Whitney was charged with having fired three shots into a fellow countryman, who however survived the onslaught. The prisoner has been receiving treatment for tuberculosis.
