HOMESTEADERS TO HAVE MORE TIME TO PROVE CLAIMS

HILO, Nov. 22.—In a conference at Hakala last Wednesday, the homesteaders whose rights were denied by the supreme court early last summer, met with Attorney Harry Irwin, representing the Territorial government and outlined plans whereby they may continue residence on the homestead tract for periods of four to eight months longer, cultivating the crops themselves, and receiving title thereto at the end of the period allotted.

This is part of the active fulfillment of the promise made Secretary of the Interior Fisher by Governor Peear—that the homesteaders against whom the supreme court ruled in the now-famous Henderson case, should be given additional time to prove up in good faith on the lands they had taken for homesteading purposes.

Virtually all this land is under cultivation at present by the Hawaiian Plantation. Attorney Irwin, appointed by the government to arrange a homesteading proposition, satisfactory to the homesteaders, has prepared a plan whereby the cases are to be divided into two classes. In one class the settlers who resided on their lands the two years required by statute and who are still living on them, are placed and given a period of four months more in which they shall live thereon and take over the entire cultivation. In the other class are those settlers who lived on their lands the statutory time, moving away later and not now resident on them. These are to return and live on and cultivate their tracts for a period of eight months, and make such improvements and alterations as will signify an intention of making the land their bona fide, permanent homes.

For still another class, those who have moved away and are unable to return, the plan outlined by the Governor is accepted as satisfactory—they to have permission to sell their right to the land to get back what they have put into it, this made possible by giving purchasers of such tracts the advantage of the length of time the original settlers resided on it. In other words, if the original homesteader lived a year on the tract, the new purchaser shall be required to live on it only a year before proving up and receiving title. This will make the homestead attractive and saleable enabling the original settler to get his right, getting a return for his time and labor put in on the land.

MAUI NOTES

WAILUKU, Maui, Nov. 22.—The new Hamakupo station of the Kahului Railroad is finished. It is about the same size as the other stations on the railroad, and is painted green with white trimmings. It is located just below the turn into the village of Hamakupo on the way up from lower Pala. J. Patterson, formerly with the Hamakupo Store, will be the new station master and postmaster also. It is expected that regular trains will be running in a few weeks now.

The choir of the Makawao and Wailuku Union Churches unite for a special Thanksgiving service to be held this coming Sunday.

The bowling alleys of the Wailuku Gymnasium have been scraped this past week and refinished, so that they present a very handsome appearance. The gym. members expect to get a lot of bowling this winter, and are anxious to try their hand once more.

Some fifty new members have this past week joined the Maui Library Association. These are from Makawao, Pala and Lahaina. In the latter place a circle has just been formed. Twenty-five new books have just been ordered for the library and another order of about the same number will be placed in a day or two.

Mrs. C. G. Gossin, who has been the librarian for one year now, has been granted by the administration committee of the library six months' leave of absence. She will depart from Maui on the December Honolulu for San Francisco. Mrs. Louise Chisholm Jones will take the Library during Mrs. Gossin's absence. Mrs. Jones begins her work on the first of December.

About twenty-five ministers and

workers of the Central Maui Evangelical Churches met at the Kaahumanu church in Wailuku last Thursday. The program of the day was a lecture by Rev. Henry P. Judd on the Life of Christ, sermon outline plans by Rev. C. G. Burnham, an exegetical study of Genesis 1-11 by Rev. A. Craig Bowdish, and an introductory study of the book of James conducted by Rev. R. B. Dodge. Lunch was served in the town hall by the ladies of the Kaahumanu church.

William Clarke, manager of the Haku Ranch and Superintendent Cameron of the Fred Baldwin Memorial Home are spending the week at the crater of Haleakala.

W. Leslie West, bookkeeper of the Wailuku Sugar Company, has been confined to his house several days this week because of sickness.

MISSIONARY WORK IN INDIA SCUDDER'S THEME

Rev. E. C. Scudder, who is a cousin of Dr. Doremas Scudder, gave an interesting address at Central Union Church Sunday morning and spoke upon the subject "Glimmerings of the Dawn in India." Taking as his text "Watchman, What of the Night? The Morning Cometh," Mr. Scudder, who has spent years in India engaged in missionary work, told his audience of the coming of religion into that country; one which has for hundreds of years past been plunged into superstition, caste and carelessness, spots, in part, as follows:

"If you would ask me 'What of the Night?' I would answer, 'The Morning Cometh,' for I see the glimmering of dawn. I see it in the unrest. Not necessarily in riots nor the unrest shown by deeds of violence—that was stopped by the grace and tact of the Delhi Durbar—but the restlessness over the restraint of caste. Things occur now which were impossible thirty years ago.

"The Indian Christian has developed wonderfully in the last few years

and is forging ahead in steady advancement. What is known as the India Church School, has been recently established in several missions, in which the missionaries make a great quarterly, and these funds are carefully administered by Indians. Thus the light is breaking, the morning cometh, and soon the Sun of Righteousness, Jesus Himself, will cause all darkness to disappear, and it is for us to pray and work for this end."

SIX CHILDREN BORN IN THIRTEEN MONTHS

FRANKLIN (Pa.), October 21.—Six children in a little over thirteen months is the remarkable record of child-bearing of Mrs. Stephen Hignett, of Frenchtown, Crawford county. She has borne fifteen children in twelve years and thirteen of them are living.
