# Charter Discussion Attracts Attention

### Many Prominent Men Take Up Question of Commission Form of Government for Honolulu—Suggestions A-Plenty Rain In Upon Advocates of the Proposed Reform in the Present System

Upon the heels of the meeting to discuss charter improvements and the commission form of government for this city, opened by Governor Frear last night, came a deluge of comment, suggestion and opposition from many of the most prominent practical men in the city today. The general feeling seemed to be that it will be just as well to "make haste slowly," and, as W. O. Smith expressed it, move forward by "making a few changes as possible, rather than by seeing how many changes can be made."

**Smith Would Amend.**  
In an interview with W. O. Smith this morning he said in substance as follows:

"As I understand the matter, one of the principal reasons for the establishing commission government in cities on the mainland was to limit the number of supervisors of aldermen to a small number so that responsibility could be placed and they be more readily held to accountability.

"Under the present law providing for the government of the city and county of Honolulu most of the essential features of commission government have been provided. The number of supervisors is limited to seven, and their accountability pretty clearly defined. There are, however, some amendments which could be well made which would render the law more effective and accomplish the result to far as the provisions of law are concerned.

"The chief difficulty here would seem to be in the charter and quality of the supervisors elected. How this can be improved by adopting the form of commission government is difficult to understand. The fact of the matter is that our chief difficulty here seems to be in the manner of administering the law. As a general proposition experience has shown that even a defective law, well administered, is more effective than a more complete law poorly administered.

"It seems to me that the object sought to be attained could be as well accomplished by a few amendments to the existing law rather than by attempting to remodel the whole law. It matters not whether the members of the governing body are called supervisors or commissioners.

"In amending laws it is generally better to accomplish the object by a few changes as possible rather than by seeing how many changes can be made, even if by so doing the whole may become somewhat more complete."

**As Shingle Sees It.**  
E. W. Shingle, chairman of the Republican Territorial central committee on legislation, recently appointed by the central committee feels differently towards the proposed legislation. He was asked what chance there is at present of the coming legislature enacting a new charter for the city and county. He said:

"I do not believe any one can predict what the legislature will do in this matter at this time. The duties of the so-called steering committee are confined strictly to drafting bills covering the different planks in the Republican platform. There is nothing in the platform calling for a new municipal charter for Honolulu.

"However, I am strongly in favor of a new charter along the lines suggested by Governor Frear at last night's meeting, and am willing to do all in my power to assist. The success of the measure will depend largely upon a campaign of education among the Hawaiian and Portuguese electorate and I would like to see Chairman Whitney appoint a strong, active committee which will endeavor by public meetings held in the Kakaako, Punchbowl and Fifth district to thoroughly explain the advantages of such a charter.

**Judd Asks "Why."**  
"I am not hostile to the proposed alterations in the present charter," said Albert F. Judd this morning. "I merely ask why any change? What is the trouble with the present system? In what has it failed? How will the proposed changes improve conditions here? On general principles I am opposed to lightly changing the organic law of the Territory or municipality.

**Mayor the Head.**  
Senator Charles F. Chillingworth, being asked for his views upon the prospect of having a new charter for Honolulu enacted at the coming session, said he had not yet given the matter much thought and did not know exactly what was proposed, adding:

"In the first place, though, all responsibility should be placed on the mayor, as originally. If the mayor is not capable to carry out his position, let us get a new mayor.

"Not having had the opportunity to go into the different phases of the proposed amendment before expressing an opinion, I would say that the question of who is to have the power of taxation is one that should be carefully considered. Has the Governor expressed any views on that subject? When the city fathers run short of money now they cannot borrow any money—not even from the Territory. Any advances to them are illegal. Coke Sees Trouble.

James L. Coke, senator-elect, when the "short ballot" charter proposition was submitted to him, said: "I do not see how we can have a much shorter ballot. You cannot have one ballot for all the officers at a general election here without violating the Organic Act.

"I have not gone into the question of charter amendment at all thoroughly, but I believe if we go to monkeying with our charter we should approach it with a great deal of care and deliberation. I believe the charter was amended by the last Legislature hastily and more for political reasons than for the good of the community. I would hesitate to take any part in amending our charter, in any important features, without first giving the people a chance to express their views on the proposed amendment.

**Wirtz Wonders.**  
Ambrose J. Wirtz, senator-elect, when asked what he thought of the new charter movement, replied:

"I have not had sufficient data as to what they are going to propose. They do not give us anything to show the working of their proposed charter. As to city government by elective commission, I do not see where they show any particular economical features, and if the purpose is economy only I do not see why we

should make a change, because the board of supervisors is a commission, and it is elective.

"With that feature continued, I would favor amending our municipal act so as to have the supervisors elected by particular districts and not by the whole city and county—that is, divide the city and county into seven supervisorial districts.

"The appointment of executive officers by the board of supervisors is wrong. I consider the board of supervisors merely a legislative body. In its primary function it can only act in a legislative capacity. When they took the power away from the mayor they were encroaching on the proper functions of the city's executive."

went to Vienna and stayed there another month. I do not believe that I have ever heard such beautiful music as I did in Vienna. The city abounds with magnificent theaters and cafes, elegant people and a fine climate. Our visit to this city was one of the features of the entire trip. We left Vienna and journeyed back to Berlin in time to see the great Emperor's parade. It was at this time all the old soldiers and other civilians were presented to the Emperor. At least fifty thousand soldiers took part in the parade which was the longest that I have ever seen.

**Gift From Kaiser.**  
"We stayed in Berlin until the middle of October and just before I left an officer of the German army called on me and presented me, as a gift from the Emperor, the decoration of the "Golden Cross of Art and Science." It was really conferred upon me as an American, and not as a German. I was really sorry to leave Berlin as we had heard some very fine music by some of the best bands and orchestras in the world, but it was at this time that the cold weather set in and we packed up and began our journey back to Honolulu.

"We left Berlin October 14 for Hamburg, and from there we took the steamer to New York, and arrived there ten days later. After a few days spent in the second largest city in the world, we made a visit to the capitol of the United States, and from there we went to Annapolis to see my grandson. We then journeyed south through Virginia, North Carolina, Alabama and on to Louisiana. We stayed in New Orleans a few hours and then took the Southern Pacific, through Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California, stopping in Los Angeles for a few days. From there we went to San Francisco and after a few days in that city took the Wilhelmina for Honolulu, and here we are. And say, it is certainly good to be back again."

such changes in the status of stations of officers as may be necessary to meet the requirements of the proviso must be ordered so as to become effective on or before the latter date.

"In order to be regarded as actually present for duty with a troop, company or battery, in the sense of the proviso, an officer must, pursuant to competent orders, be in such actual relation to said organization as will make him available without further orders to perform the usual duties of his grade with respect to said organization, with the primary purpose of performing them, so that he stands ready and able to perform them as they arise in the course of military administration."

"Additional duties may be assigned to an officer of company grade belonging to a troop, battery or company without prejudice to his right to be regarded as actually present for duty therewith, provided the assignment of such additional duty leaves him in the duty status with respect to the organization, as hereinafter defined."

"Battalion, squadron, regimental and artillery district staff officers and other officers withdrawn from the performance of troop, battery or company duties are, while so withdrawn, not actually present for duty with a troop, battery or company."

"Service with recruit companies, prison guard companies, machine gun platoons, regimental detachments, rifle teams, the army service detachments at military academy, the service schools, the war college, and the cavalry, field artillery and engineer detachments maintained at the military academy, is not service with a troop, battery company of that branch of the army in which the officer is commissioned."

"An officer of company grade who is sick in quarters, or in hospital at his post or elsewhere, or in quarantine, or in compliance with summons from a civil or military court, or in arrest, or undergoing trial, or traveling in compliance with orders to change station from one company assigned to another, or absent with
