Lunafillo Home. Thanksgiving will be observed at the Lunafillo Home tomorrow with a big turkey dinner. There will be no service other than this.

Leahi Home. Ever since the Leahi Home was established eleven years ago, Mrs. George R. Carter has furnished the turkey for the big Thanksgiving dinner, and she will do the same this year. Other friends of the Home have all done something toward the dinner this year and the pupils of the Liliuokalani School have given a helping hand. The dinner will be served at twelve o'clock.

Taft's Canal Tolls Please

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—The President is credited with having done fairly well in fixing the Panama Canal tolls at \$1.20. That popular sentiment generally leans to the belief that it was right to name the same figure as that charged for usage of the Suez waterway, thereby preventing the detriment likely to follow higher rates for the American passage. It will place the world's shipping on a competitive basis from the beginning. The only objection lies in the fact that the big ditch will not become self-sustaining for 20 years under the rate fixed. But the American people are extremely proud of the canal and are willing to stand the added expense for 20 years in order to have an even start with the older Suez Canal.

Prof. Johnson has submitted a batch of computations to demonstrate that the advantages of the Western route will be such as to gradually bring in additional traffic until 20 years hence all the charges of maintenance will be fully met by the growing business.

The rate announced by the President is 30 cents lower than that favored by a majority of Congressmen. They thought it preferable the canal should have a chance to pay its own expenses from near the start and would have preferred a higher rate without any reference to that charged for usage of the Suez Canal.

His proposal has met with approval in many quarters, and the publication probably will be given the Governor's approval of the provision of separation of powers and territorial elections, a strong primary and representative system, placing the responsibility of local government in the hands of men.
