STAGE SET FOR
COLLEGE PLAY AT
PUNAHOU TONIGHT

Students of the College of Hawaii
will give the first performance of
"The Revolving Wedge" at the
Charles B. Bishop Hall, Punahou, to-
night at a quarter past eight o'clock.
The play is a football romance in one
act and deals with the great Thanksgiv-
ing football game of '96 between
Harvard and the University of Penn-
sylvania. The scene is laid in Cam-
bridge at the home of Mr. Martin. The
plot is very clever and well worked
out. Mr. Martin is an eccentric old
gentleman, who believes in the old-
fashioned observance of Thanksgiving,
the family dinner. His son, Bob,
is a Harvard man and plays half-back
on the Harvard football team. He
wishes to have his family present at
the big game on Thanksgiving Day,
but Mr. Martin is strongly opposed to
this as it would interfere with Thanksgiv-
ing dinner which he is set on hav-
ing. The plot of "The Revolving
Wedge" hinges upon these two situa-
tions and involves many interesting
and amusing incidents.

the Boy's glee club of Punahou will

The principal characters in the play
are Nora and Mr. Martin. Many
amusing situations are portrayed by
Miss Foster in the role of Nora, and
Mr. Cousens is excellent as Mr.
Martin. Others who play leads are
Mr. Clark and Miss Smith as Bob
and Nell.

The original intention of the man-
agement was to give but one perfor-
mance but the sale of tickets was so
great that it was decided to give
a second performance tomorrow night.
A few people can be accommodated
at the door on both these nights as
all the tickets have not been sold.
There will be no reserved seats either
night but there will be a seat for
every ticket for the night they are
good. Special sections set off in the
respective school colors will be
reserved for the Punahou and McKinley
football teams on Wednesday night.
On Thursday night all the seats will
be open.

A large audience is expected for
both nights and there is not the slight-
est doubt but that they will get their
money's worth and more. In the re-
hearsals that have been held every-
thing has worked out to perfection
and both Dr. and Mrs. Andrew, who
are coaching the play, are extremely
well satisfied.

The stage settings are due to the
kindness of J. Hepp & Co., furniture
dealers of Honolulu. The costumes
are to be furnished by the cast.

The first dress rehearsal was held
last night and the entire cast showed
up to perfection. The costumes are
typical and original and are well
carried by the wearers. The re-
hearsal gave an idea of what the play
will be like on Wednesday and Thurs-
day nights and it would be hard to
pick any imperfections in it.
Tickets for Thursday night can be
had at Arleigh's and at the door. A
few tickets for tonight still remain
on hand. The tickets are twenty-five
cents.
