BY AUTHORITY. REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE DISCHARGE OF NITRATE OF SODA, SULPHUR AND OTHER SIMILAR MATERIALS UPON THE WHARVES OF THE TERRITORY OF HAWAII, AS AMENDED AUGUST 28, 1912.

No nitrate of soda, sulphur, or other similar materials shall be stored, awaiting transportation, upon any wharf within the Territory of Hawaii, unless the same be packed in sound and non-leaky containers. All nitrate of soda, sulphur or other similar materials so stored shall, at the expense of the consignee, be under the continuous care of a competent watchman until removed.

Masters, owners and consignees of nitrate of soda cargoes, sulphur or other similar materials must keep the wharf at all times swept clean and free of any loose nitrate of soda, sulphur or other similar materials during the entire process of unloading and removing the cargo. No loose nitrate of soda, sulphur or other similar materials will be permitted to be landed. In all cases nitrate of soda, sulphur or other similar materials must be landed from ships in sound containers.

During the process of discharging or removing said cargoes, it shall be obligatory on the part of the ship or agents of said vessel, to provide water containers of not less than fifty (50) gallons each at intervals of not less than fifty (50) feet apart with suitable buckets placed alongside each container; said containers to be filled with a solution of water and nitrate of soda to be used in the case of fire.

Any person or persons who shall violate the above Regulation shall be subject to the penalties as provided by Section 9, Act 153 of the Session Laws of 1911.

Over-Night Wireless To the Advertiser

A meeting of all representatives in Havana of foreign governments was held yesterday to consider the question of protection of foreign diplomats. The hitherto hostile tone of the Cuban newspapers against Hugh H. Gibson, the United States charge d'affaires, who was assaulted last week by Enrique Maza, a newspaper reporter, has moderated with the exception of one or two, which continue to pour out torrents of venom against him.

The Baroness von Eckardstein, a Prussian noblewoman, is dead in Berlin, the victim of a wild bear hunt. She was accidentally shot and mortally wounded by her kinsman, Count Finck von Finckenstein.

Captain J. E. Bell, Second Infantry, Honolulu, who has been on special detail to army service schools, is on his way back to his home station and is in this city. First Lieutenant Dorsey R. Rodney, Fifth Cavalry, Honolulu, who has been on detail to the mounted service school, is also here, en route to Hawaii.

The large force of police which has been stationed around the John D. Rockefeller estate in Pocantico Hills, Tarrytown, New York, was established because of threats of death received by Mr. Rockefeller and members of his family from "Black Hand" agents.

Startling evidence on the subject of police graft in New York City is likely to be revealed in the reports of the aldmanic investigation committee which is just beginning to work in that city.

Evidence has been submitted to the committee within the last 24 hours covering a period of three years and involving nineteen police directors or captains and numerous lesser officers in graft charges. It is said that the police inspectors in Manhattan Borough districts, twelve police captains of the same borough, one police captain in the Bronx, and four in Brooklyn have been enriched by the tolls obtained from disorderly houses and gambling dens.

Warren J. Cody, 38 years old, killed Mrs. Elizabeth Smith and then committed suicide Monday night in the woman's home in Los Angeles. Cody crushed Mrs. Smith's head with a hammer and ended his own life by blowing out his brains. Jealousy is said to have been the motive.

News has just been received at Christiania that Dr. W. S. Bruce, the noted Arctic explorer, and his party, who have been exploring Spitzbergen, were rescued by a steamer at Advent Bay, which they had reached after a long and perilous trip.

The battleships of the Atlantic fleet were at Tangier Sound, in Chesapeake Bay, today, engaged in firing shots at a regulation skeleton mast on the bulk of the San Marcos, formerly the battleship Texas. Shots were fired so they would explode in the cage mast and determine the vitality of the supports.

The State Department received a dispatch today from Minister Weitzel in Nicaragua, reporting conditions growing worse in the vicinity of Granada, and confirming press reports of suffering of the people, who are practically without food supplies.
