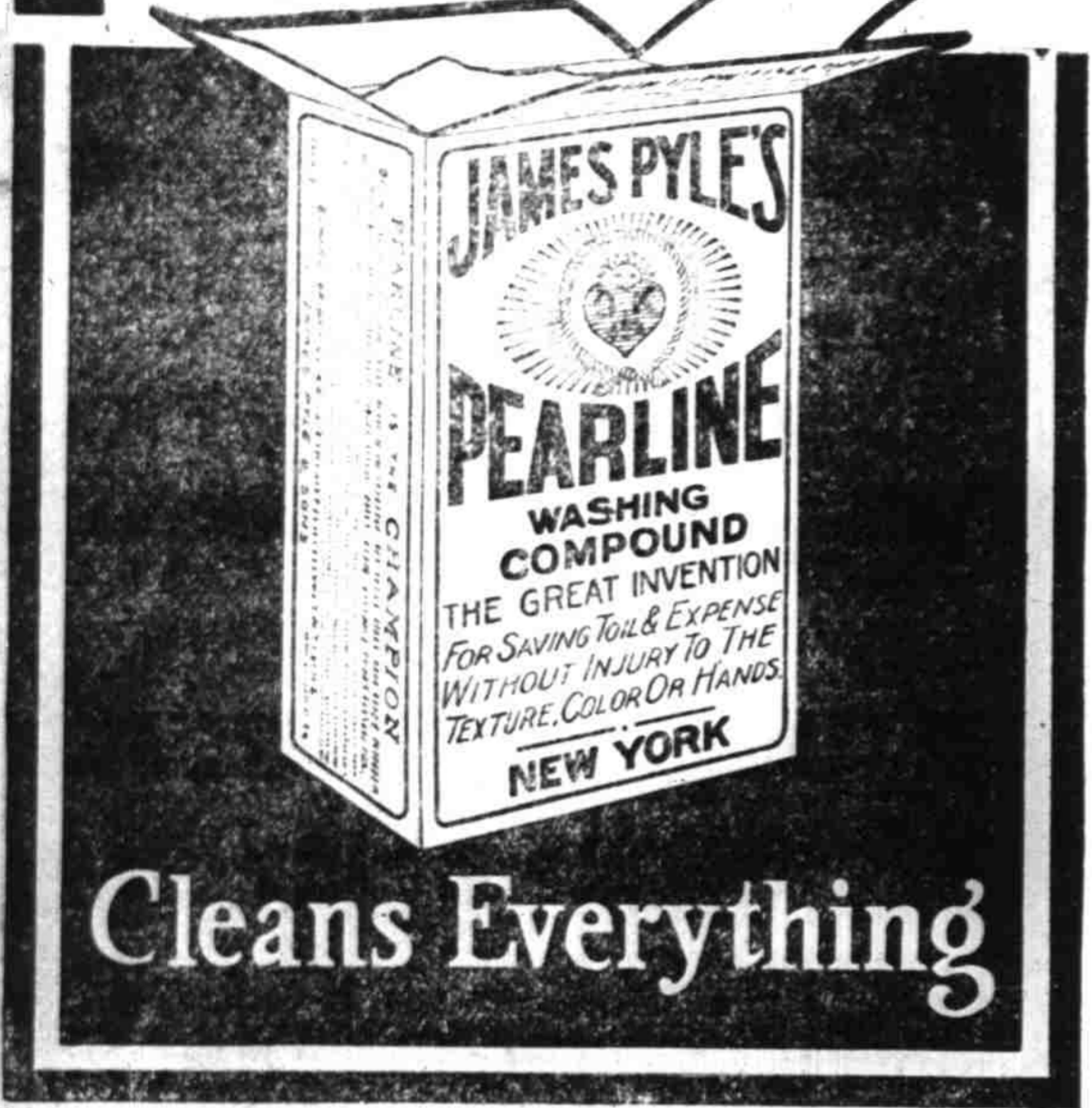

## SPLENDID WORK SHOWN BY WOMAN'S BOARD OF MISSIONS

Meeting Shows Steady Advance in Missionary Work; New Officers Named

After an adjournment of three months the Woman's Board of Missions of Central Union Church met in the chapel of the church at half past two o'clock yesterday afternoon. The meeting was opened with a hymn, after which the president, Mrs. Theodore Richards read from the one hundred and twenty-sixth psalm. In her remarks regarding the plans of the year Mrs. Richards spoke of the large field here in Honolulu where the seed of helpfulness may be sown. The president's remarks were followed by the report of the forty-first annual meeting read by Miss Margaretta Sheely. At this meeting with the exception of the retiring of Mrs. Arthur Alexander, who has served two terms and Miss Juliet Cooke, who is absent from the city, and Mrs. E. A. Jones, who has been elected president of the Gleamers, the official circle has remained the same. The new officers appointed are: vice presidents, Mrs. Doremus Scudder, Mrs. W. J. Forbes, and Mrs. J. P. Erdman. Mrs. Carl Andrews was appointed home secretary and Miss Agnes Judd foreign corresponding secretary. The other officers renamed at yesterday's meeting are: president, Mrs. Theodore Richards, Honorary Vice Presidents: Mrs. S. E. Bishop, Miss M. A. Chamberlain, Mrs. O. H. Gulick, and Mrs. L. B. Coan. Active Vice Presidents, Mrs. W. C. Hobdy and Mrs. August Drahms of Hilo; Recording Secretary, Miss Margaretta Sheely; Home Corresponding Secretary Mrs. Carl B. Andrews; Treasurer, Mrs. B. F. Dillingham; Assistant Treasurer, Mrs. W. L. Moore; President Missionary Gleamers, Mrs. E. A. Jones; President Lima Kukuia, Miss Bertha Kemp; President Aurora Society, Mrs. James P. Herrick; President Kin Kok Kong Tau Fui, Miss Mary Lee.

Superintendent among Hawaiians Miss Laura Green; Superintendent of work among Chinese, Mrs. F. W. Damon; Missionary among Chinese, Mrs. E. MacKenzie; Superintendent of work among Chinese, Mrs. O. H. Gulick; Missionary work among Japanese, Miss Julia Gulick; Superintendent of work among Portuguese, Mrs. A. V. Soares; Trustees of permanent fund, Mrs. S. M. Damon, Mrs. B. F. Dillingham and Mrs. J. B. Atherton.

Following the report of the secretary were the reports of the treasurer, Mrs. B. F. Dillingham, and that of the home secretary, which was read by Miss Sheely.

The reading of the reports and the reading of the vacation notes were interspersed with a short talk and plea for aid from Miss Louisa Gulick, Miss Gulick who is serving on the Cost of Living Committee in the Social Survey which at the present time is occupying the time and attention of so many of the thinking people in Honolulu, asked for members of the Board of Missions to, if they felt that they were able, look after the expense of some family here for one year. Families are provided with blankets which they are supposed to fill out each day and the investigator, who has a similar sheet is supposed to see that these papers are kept up to date. In a year's time those in charge of this department hope to be able to tell of the high cost of living here, the reasons therefor, and of possible to recommend a remedy.

Much Work Done During Summer. Although many of the members of the Woman's Board of Missions have not been active during the heat of the summer months, Miss Laura Green, who has charge of the work among the Hawaiians has kept busy. During the months of July and August Miss Green made twenty social calls and nine business calls among the Hawaiians. There has been illness among some of the women who have come under the observation of the board but for the most part the Hawaiian women are doing very well and are exceedingly interested in the missionary work. The children in the Moihill Sunday School though given the privilege of closing the school in the warm weather preferred to attend the class.

Miss Julia Lydia Gulick who is a missionary among the Japanese had a summer that contrasted somewhat to that of Miss Green. The greater part of her time was occupied entertaining missionary visitors who passed through Honolulu. The work among the Japanese is progressing, however, and the new churches both in Honolulu and in Hilo will soon be dedicated. Mr. Okamura of the Makiki Chapel who is at the present time making a tour of the world is expected here in the early part of October. During the summer the Sunday school and Bible classes have continued their activities.

Subject For Study. The subject that the Board is to study this year is taken from Mrs. Helen Barrett Montgomery's book, "The Light of the World," the general subject being "A Comparative Study of the World's Great Religions." The first paper on this subject was read at yesterday's session by Mrs. Emerson. Mrs. Emerson told of the different forms of worship and the various places in which the people worship in the different parts of the world visited by her in her travels. She told of one of the ancient Hawaiian places of worship where the fisherman made his offering to the Fish God and of the Great Burial of the Japanese. In the Mohammedan Mosque luxury and beauty prevail and there is much splendor to be seen. She also told of the temples in India where the inhabitants worship their gods. In England, Mrs. Emerson visited Westminster Abbey and was greatly impressed with its rare old beauty. She also attended some of the services at the Hebrew

Synagogue. Where a great many attend the services usually are seated in a place apart. In the French Protestant Churches there is a large school attendance. One reason for this is that the speakers use such pure beautiful French and students find that they gain a great deal from listening to them. One of the interesting places visited by this lady was Lugan, Switzerland, where a religious festival was in progress and in which many gymnasts contested.

Mrs. Emerson's remarks were exceedingly interesting and were thoroughly appreciated by her audience.

After Mrs. Emerson's address, Mrs. Coan read two interesting letters from Armenian boys who are receiving a Christian education at the hands of the Woman's Board of Missions of Honolulu and who are very grateful for the benefits which they have received. One of the young men is still in school while the other is learning the shoemaker's trade and an expression of love and the Christian spirit was brought out in his letter when he said that his mother used to say such bitter things about the slaves of his father, now with her children only hopes that good things may come to them.

For Trained Organizer. At the close of the meeting both Miss Sheely and Mrs. Richards told of their efforts in regards to the securing of the services of a trained missionary organizer. In May the board thought it wise to secure, if possible, the services of such a person and while they have not been entirely successful up to the present time it is hoped that in the near future the results of the efforts will be satisfactory.

At four o'clock the meeting adjourned to convene again the first Tuesday in October.

## CHAFIN PUTS LIVING COST ON LIQUOR EXCESS

WAKESHA, Wis. — Challenging Wilson, Taft, Roosevelt and Debs alike, to debate with him the true reasons for the present "high cost of living," calling for the establishment by the national government of a Department of Peace which should lead the world in abolishing war, and pointing out that practically every progressive plank of 1912 in other party platforms but echo the emphatic declarations of the Prohibition party for the last forty years, Eugene W. Chafin, candidate of the Prohibition party for president of the United States, accepted his commission here this afternoon at the formal notification meeting.

Despite the fact that an obstinate and persistent downpour of rain interfered with the elaborate preparations for an open-air rally in Waukesha's famous Cutler park, the program was successfully carried out before a splendidly representative audience in the First Methodist Church.

Many states were represented, and among those present besides the candidates, were Dr. C. H. Mead, permanent chairman of the national convention, who officially notified Mr. Chafin, Acting National Chairman Charles R. Jones; Robert H. Patton, state chairman of Illinois; W. G. Calderwood, state chairman of Minnesota; Matthew E. O'Brien, member of the national committee from Washington, D. C.; Capt. Charles H. Stanley of California; E. Deets Pickett and Fred D. L. Squires of American Advance and Associated Prohibition Press, and from Wisconsin, State Chairman J. Burr Smith, gubernatorial Candidate Hill, L. E. Clayton, county chairman of Milwaukee, and many others.

Mr. and Mrs. Chafin and their daughter, Miss Desdemona, were host and hostesses at both luncheon and dinner to a large group of visiting Prohibitionists, whom they entertained at the delightful old home which they occupied as a family residence for upwards of a quarter of a century.

Notwithstanding the weather, Waukesha was in gala attire for her famous son, and surely Mr. Chafin is an exception to the old proverb that "a prophet is not without honor save in his own city."
