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PLANS ARE MADE TO BEAUTIFY SHAFTER

Fort Shafter, already one of the most beautiful army posts in the United States, is to be beautified, still more, and in a way that combines the practical and artistic.

Maj. John H. Wholley, commanding the post, has been planning improvements from a beauty standpoint for some time, and now, in conjunction with Gerigt P. Wilder, the plans are being drafted into definite form. Mr. Wilder's advice was asked, as he is a recognized expert on Hawaiian flora and is keenly alive to artistic effects

as well, and he entered into the idea with great enthusiasm. Under his direction a detailed scheme of beautification has been worked out and yesterday he visited the post to go over the ground with Maj. Wholley and put the finishing touches on the plans.

The most important element in the plans, it is understood, is to be the planting of trees. Mr. Wilder's expert knowledge of trees and their growth in the islands came into good use, and he has suggested a five-row plan which will give the maximum of benefit and handsome effect. Eucalyptus, Hawaiian mahogany, poinciana and other trees are to be planted, and Mr. Wilder visited the government nursery yesterday afternoon to arrange for the supply.
