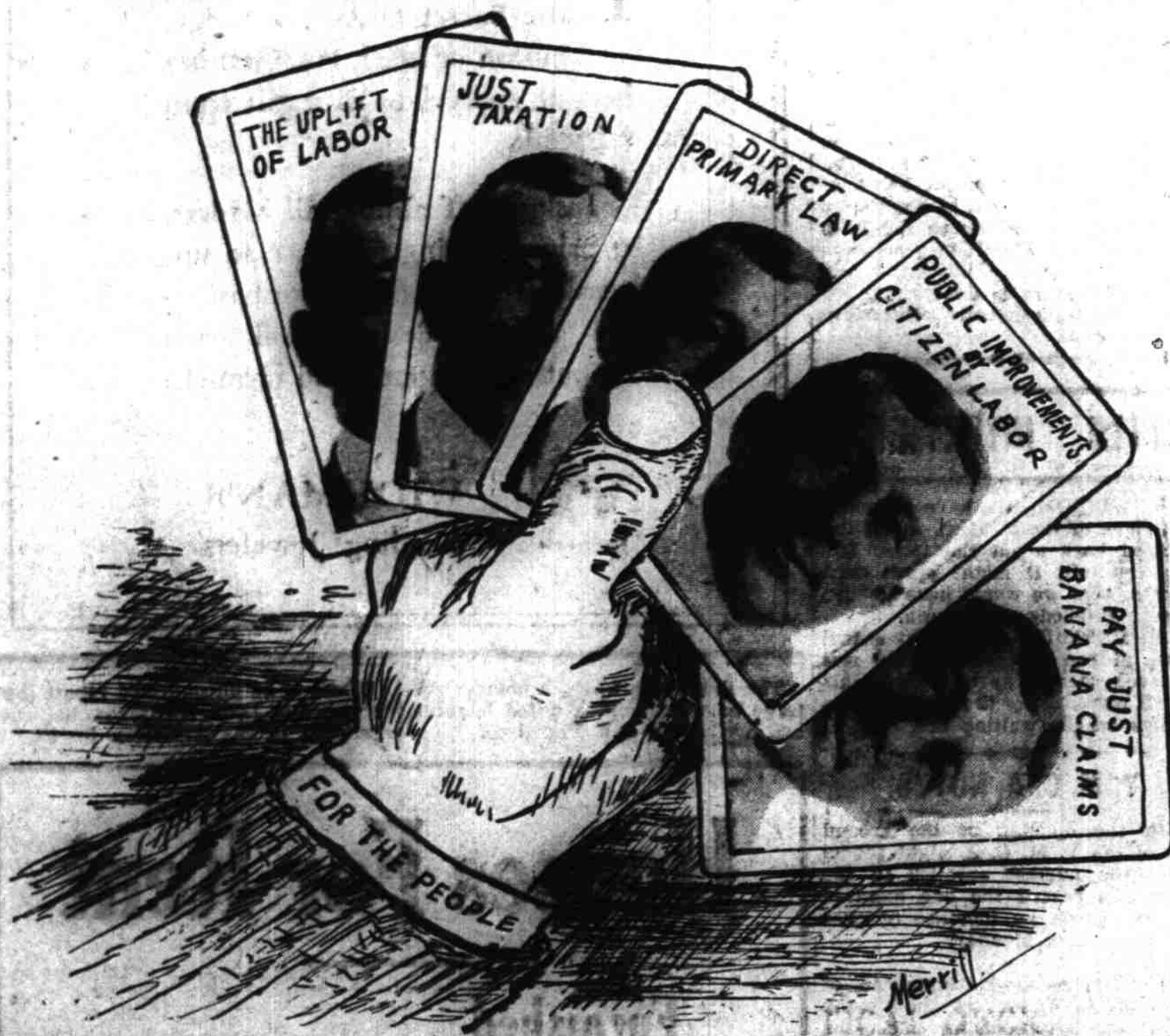

THOUSANDS TRAMP OVER HIS FORTUNE

Ocean Park Fire Victim Recovers Treasure Buried in the Sand

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 20.—Nineteen thousand dollars in silver, gold and bills, the receipts of the Dragon Gorge for three days prior to the fire that swept Ocean Park's amusement and business section, was recovered from its bed in the beach sand today by Cashier Arthur Willets.

When the flames drove Willets from his office he hastily placed the money in a gunny sack and rushing to the beach buried the sack in the sand. Today, having recovered from his burns and injuries, Willets went to the beach and dug out his small fortune, which had been trod over by thousands of persons since the fire.

MAUI QUARANTINE FUND NOT NOW NEEDED

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence) WAILUKU, October 13.—The regular meeting of the Maui Chamber of Commerce was held at the rooms of the County Supervisors last Wednesday afternoon. There were one or two interesting reports presented at the meeting. J. N. S. Williams, chairman of the Quarantine Fund Committee, reported that committee that the special tonnage tax of ten cents per ton on all foreign and American freight would no longer be charged, unless there should an emergency arise at some time in the future, making the renewal of the tax necessary.

The committee has accomplished a great amount of good since its organization during the epidemic in 1911. The detention camp for Wailuku and Kahului has taken care of the serious cases of contagious diseases, and it is the purpose to continue this camp to handle all such cases in the future. It is interesting to note that Kahului port has remained a "clean port," in spite of the fact that other ports in the Territory have not had that good reputation.

The other members of the Committee are H. B. Penhallow, F. F. Baldwin, D. C. Lindsay and Joaquin Garcia. H. A. Baldwin has always attended the meetings of the Committee, and at their request has assisted the members.

The report of the Committee is as follows, which shows total collections of nearly \$18,500 to the end of this month, and a balance of nearly \$5500 on hand. This sum will be used for the immediate future work of the committee.
