The eleven officers who arrived on the Logan Sunday, and who are not familiar with the terrain, are being given a series of "seeing Oahu" trips in the headquarters automobiles. One party went sightseeing at 9 this morning, and another lot at 1:30 this afternoon. The morning passengers were Major Penn, Major Blakely, Captain Shipp, Captain McCarskey, Captain Smith, and Major Noble. In the afternoon those who took in the sights from the army "rubberneck" were Major Penn, Captain Bryson, Lieut. Murray, Captain Brees, Captain Burt and Captain J. S. Johnson.

What is officially known as Memorandum No. 1, Field Maneuvers, came from the printers this morning. It contains information regarding and regulations for the battle of Oahu, which is to be waged next week.

Following are some of the principal points covered in the memorandum: General Instructions for Commanding Officers.

The maximum effective personnel in the field is required. To this end the services of chaplains will be utilized during the absence of troops in the administration of posts. Bandmen, men of mounted organizations for whom no mounts are available and who cannot be utilized as train guards, sick men able to do light duty, etc., will be utilized to the fullest extent as caretakers and guards.

Commanders will caution their men and officers to exercise the greatest care in the prevention of fires, if fires do occur the nearest troops will be sent by their immediate commander to extinguish such fires, report being made to the nearest umpire, who will make proper allowance for time lost.

Troops crossing cultivated lands off the Military Reservations will confine themselves to roads and well-defined trails. Gates will be used and fences will not be cut or destroyed. Umpires will make due allowance for situations created in the observance of these rules. Particular care will be taken that men and animals do not molest or destroy growing crops, fruit or vegetables.

Immediate commanders will see that all damage to private property, when repairable, is repaired before the organization causing the damage leaves the immediate vicinity thereof; when not repairable a full report of the damage done will be submitted to the force commander on the day on which is acute. If necessary a board of officers to assess damages will be appointed after the close of the maneuvers.

No ball ammunition for either revolvers, rifles or machine guns will be carried except a few rounds of ammunition for use in emergencies, which will remain in possession of company, troop and battery commanders.

The number of rounds of blank cartridges carried each day will be as follows: Rifle, 20 per man; revolver, 10 per man; machine gun platoon, 550 revolver; battery of artillery, 25 rounds per gun.

No blank ammunition will be fired except in the proper course of the field exercises. Cases of infraction of this order will be promptly disciplined.

Instructions for Red and Blue Commanders.
Each commander will select and appoint his necessary staff.

Each commander will cause to be carried with the headquarters baggage of his command one (1) wall tent for the senior umpire. Each battalion and squadron headquarters, and each separate battery will carry one (1) wall tent for the umpire who may be assigned to that unit.

The troops may maneuver in and about the new post at Schofield Barracks between October 21st and 26th should this be deemed necessary at any time by the Red or Blue commanders, but care must be taken that the construction work is not unnecessarily interfered with.

Supply and Transportation.
Fuel and forage will be distributed in advance to the points of concentration, under the direction of the Chief Quartermaster of the Department. Mounts for Umpires and Observers.

The Commanding Officer, 1st Field Artillery, will furnish from the Band 1st Field Artillery (twenty) horses for umpires and authorized observers. The Commanding Officer, 5th Cavalry, will furnish twenty mounted umpires for use as messengers and for interpreters. Each of these umpires will be prepared to bring an extra set of saddle equipment from his troop.

Signals.
The following signals will be used during the maneuvers for the purposes noted below.

Discharge of two bombs in succession indicates suspension of operations or close of phase. Troops to remain in position.

Discharge of one bomb indicates suspension of operations or close of phase. Troops to remain in position.

Motorcycles and Automobiles.
Motorcycles in messengers used in the field. Umpires and the Senior Umpire must be given the right of way by troops at all times.

Automobiles used by persons or men of either force must remain
