## NOW READY FOR CARNEGIE'S THOUSANDS

### "Ironmaster" Has Been Notified That Conditions of His Gift Are Complied With.

That Honolulu is to have a Carnegie Library that will be a distinct and lasting ornament among the public buildings of the city is now practically assured, fulfilling the promise that the "Ironmaster" made in the course of a conversation with Governor Frear some months ago in New York.

The Territorial Government, the trustees of the Honolulu Reading Room Association and those of the Historical Society, have done their part in making the necessary arrangement that will conform to the stipulations exacted by Carnegie before concluding his library gifts. The last Legislature appropriated the sum of \$10,000 per year for the maintenance of the library of Hawaii, and through the amalgamation with the Honolulu Reading Room Association and the Historical Society, it is estimated that an additional annual income of \$5000 will be secured for the operating expenses of the institution.

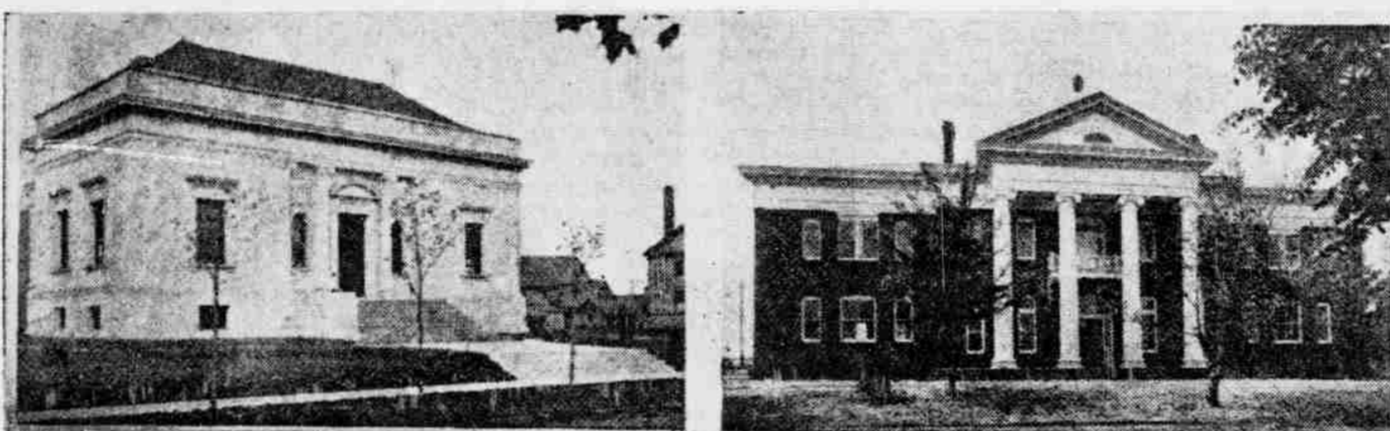
All the details of the plan as it stands at the present time have been forwarded to Carnegie and his decision is expected at any time. All of the requirements that Carnegie insists upon for the upkeep of the libraries will be fully complied with, and there is no doubt that the "Ironmaster" will act favorably on the suggestion that he extend his liberality so as to include the Territory of Hawaii.

#### \$100,000, Sum Expected.

It is understood that a donation of about \$100,000 will be received from Carnegie for the cost of the library building in Honolulu. There is a possibility, however, that the amount will be increased by \$50,000, the conditions having been more than met by the action of the trustees of the two associations and the appropriation by the Legislature.

In speaking of the conditions of the library gift yesterday Governor Frear said that if the formal statement of the action of the Legislature and the agreement between the trustees of the Honolulu Reading Room Association and the Historical Society and the Library of Hawaii, was now before Mr. Carnegie an early decision could be expected from him.

The Governor stated that there was a possibility that the letter did not reach Mr. Carnegie before his departure for Scotland on his annual visit to his old home. If this is so, it will be some time before word is received from him.
