Honolulu Cable Contract Is Let

New York, Nov. 19.--The Commercial Pacific Cable Company, recently organized for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a cable across the Pacific Ocean, and of which John W. Mackay is president, today awarded the contract for the manufacture and laying of the first section of the great submarine strand to the Silverton Cable Manufacturing Company of Silverton, near London.

The actual work of laying the cable will consume about seventeen days and with the additional time for establishing the stations and allowing for possible mishaps, it will be ready for service in two months after its arrival here.

The company has assured us they will complete the cable and have it in service in seven months. Just as soon as this section is complete and out on another section that will connect the Hawaiian Islands with the Philippines.

FRIVOLOUS CASE FINALLY SETTLED

A Trivial Auction Bill Resisted in Three Courts.

TAX APPEAL COURT ONCE MORE REVERSED

Adoption of Natural Child Confirmed --- Jury Panel Challenged --- Probate Matters Are Adjudicated.

Mrs. F. C. Betters will have to pay James F. Morgan an auction sale bill of \$225 after fighting it through the District, Circuit and Supreme Courts. A unanimous opinion of the final court has been rendered, overruling the exceptions of defendant to the judgment ordered by Judge Gear without a jury.
