Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Minister of the Interior until 12 o'clock noon on Saturday, the 28th day of February, 1885, for the construction of the works herein named.

Plans and specifications may be examined at the office of the Minister on and after the 9th day of February, 1885.

The works to be constructed are— First—The basin of the Storage Reservoir, i.e., removing all trees and other vegetable growths, and excavating and removing all earth and rock within the indicated lines.

Second—Building a dam of first-class rubble masonry laid in full beds of hydraulic cement. Third—Laying the line of fifteen and twelve inch pipes and setting gates between the storage reservoir and that of distribution, and from the latter to the point of connection with the pipe system of the city. Note—This work may be divided and let in two or three sections.

Fourth—Constructing the distributing reservoir consisting of an excavation lined with hydraulic cement, concrete or brick-work laid in full hydraulic cement beds and joints, the crosswall and bays to be similarly constructed and the whole roofed over.

All proposals must be endorsed "Proposals for doing the particular work for which the bid is made".

A bond must be executed by the contractor with two (2) approved sureties conditioned upon the faithful performance of the contract.

The Minister reserves the right to reject the lowest or any bid.

Bids may be made for all the above in one contract.

Island Notes.

Hilo, Dec. 19, 1884.

A fishing-boat containing two white men and one half-white was blown away from Cocosnut Island shortly after the steamer left, and nothing was heard from them for some time. As soon as the gale subsided a little, our Sheriff sent a boat in search of them, and they were found some distance from land and brought to shore.

It has rained here very heavily lately, and the wind has blown a regular gale.

Kohala, Hawaii, Dec. 27.

The letters mentioned as going astray between Hawaii and Maui we learn, upon inquiry, were posted at the regular office, and not entrusted to a friend; and further, we learn that one has never yet reached its destination.

We hear that Mr. Chapin, manager of the Kohala Plantation, is again down with his old complaint. We wish him a quick recovery.

Another ball on the docket for the New Year at the Club. A good evening is hoped for, as a merry time is certain under the management that is.

Heavy southerly winds prevailed during the week, doing some damage to fumes, but not so much as the previous years.

A Chinaman at Niuli scalded his foot at the mill, but will have no permanent trouble from it.

Most of the mills in the district are grinding, so that things look lively about us.

A Chinaman at Halawa caught his hand in a cane cutter, and so badly injured two of the fingers that Dr. Thompson was obliged to amputate them.

Is it not rather outrageous that our Chinese laborers should not be informed about their taxes until they are overdue, and then be called upon by a policeman who demands one dollar extra from every one of them?

The Chinese at Makapala had a very pleasant time on Christmas Eve, which they made the occasion for a Christmas tree. Rev. Mr. Whalley, who has the religious teaching of them, seems to be much trusted and beloved, and is doing good work among them not only by his instruction, but by his kind attentions to their wants and substantial aid when sick, or in distress. Talking pious and not seeing it is bound to get you left in the race, and Mr. Whalley's success is deserved.
