MARY PICKFORD SUED FOR \$103,750 BY FORMER PROMOTER

NEW YORK.—Mrs. Gladys Mary Moore, known in the screen as Mary Pickford, has been sued in the supreme court for \$103,750 damages. The plaintiff is Cora C. Wilkening, formerly manager of Miss Pickford. The plaintiff alleges that she acted as manager and promoter of Miss

Wilbur Rogan, premier pitcher of the 25th Inf., has signed to play with the Los Angeles White Sox, considered one of the leading colored teams in the country. John Anderson's team is given the following notice in a Los Angeles newspaper:

Columns have been devoted to various characteristics and qualifications of baseball magnates, devotees of the great American game, but here is a story of a magnate unique in the annals of this famous pastime.

John Anderson, known as the "Black Prince," rated as a millionaire and retired from the business world, is devoting his energy and capital to promote his favorite hobby. He is the owner of the L. A. White Sox, a colored aggregation of ball players.

"It is my ambition to be the owner of a ball club that will prove to be the greatest colored aggregation in the world. At present I have three great stars in pitchers, Mooney, Donaldson and my latest acquisition, Rogan, whom I have secured from Honolulu. I am negotiating for other stars to strengthen the Sox lineup and I will not be satisfied until I have a club without a flaw. The white teams have their champions and I will spare no expense to make my club the greatest colored aggregation in the land," said "Black Prince" Anderson.

Donaldson is considered to be the greatest southpaw in the business, although to date he has failed to pitch a sensational game for the Sox. However, he has proven effective and may be expected at any time to show his real class.

Mooney is Anderson's old standby. He possesses a "shoe string" ball which has proven the undoing of many opposing clubs. His headwork while in the box proves his worth as a finished pitcher.

Rogan, the latest addition to the Sox, is one of the greatest colored players in the business, performing at any position on the diamond or outfield with his pitching and heavy batting as his principal assets. Rogan has a record of pitching 54 consecutive innings without allowing a run, a record within two innings of equalling Walter Johnson's great record of 56 consecutive innings without a score.

The White Sox meet the Westerns this afternoon at Meier Park, Vernon, in the first game of the new league schedule. Rogan will pitch for the Sox.

HIGH PAY FOR MCGRAW

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 25.—President Hemstead of the New York National League baseball club announced here today that Manager John J. McGraw has signed a five-year contract calling for a salary of \$50,000 a year. Hemstead said:

"McGraw is said to be the highest paid man in baseball, and he deserves to be. He has been with the Giants since 1902, and we hope to have him with the club so long as he remains in baseball."

Previous to signing the contract McGraw's salary was announced as \$30,000 a year.

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Duke, Cunha, Lane, Kelli, Kruger and Others Will Go After Records at Y. M. C. A.

Tonight at the Y. M. C. A. tank the opening events of the International Swimming Pentathlon will be held. From present indications the team of last year is to be excelled by Duke Kahanamoku, George Cunha and John Kelli will be added to the forces of those who last year won this event quite easily.

These three swimmers will be added to Stubby Kruger, Clarence Lane, A. B. Carter, Jr., Ah Kim Yee, George Hawkins and others to make up an exceptionally strong combination.

Feature Events
And yet these swimmers are strongest only in the three sprints. When it comes to unrelenting in the water and towing another fellow your own weight, there will probably be another bunch of swimmers who will make these go to hold their own.

Last year A. B. Carter won the towing race in 33:1, taking it away from the field. In the unrelenting event however, Kruger added to his prowess by breaking the scoring chart. This event is the star entertaining attraction of the meet. The swimmer stands on the bank with his hands in his coat pockets, and at the pistol shot he rises off his coat and shoes and jumps into the water. The swimmer must swim across the tank and half way back, at which point he dives to the bottom of the pool and brings up a bag of sand. As he reaches the surface with the bag he drops it and immediately goes at it to undress down to his bathing suit. As soon as collar, tie, shirt, vest, pants and socks are off he swims 10 feet to the finishing line.

Kruger Won Last Time
Last year Kruger did all this in the remarkable time of 49 4-5 seconds and as far as could be ascertained he won 4981 points for doing it. It is doubtful if this event will be accomplished again in as fast time.

The swimmers are asked to supply themselves with the necessary clothing for this event and the association pays for the pressing and laundry bills.

In the towing event Carter won by placing his left hand under the "dead man's" chin and with a strong overarm and trudgeon kick managed the 25 yards in 33 1-5 seconds.

A gold medal is awarded the local swimmer winning most points as a grand total. Last year a medal was also awarded Lane for his most excellent work in the 75 yards, when he established a local tank record of 39:3.

Record May Go
The 50-yard backstroke is really the only record expected to be excelled. In this event Stubby Kruger is in better form even than he was last year and the world champion at this event ought to do even better.

The best local timers are being secured to handle the watches, since timing is the most important work of this sort of a meet.

Harry Decker is acting as referee and Clair Tait will ably handle the starting position.
