Mrs. Charles Atterton, to the gratification of her large circle of friends, is recovering very nicely from her appendicitis operation, and will be home shortly from the hospital.

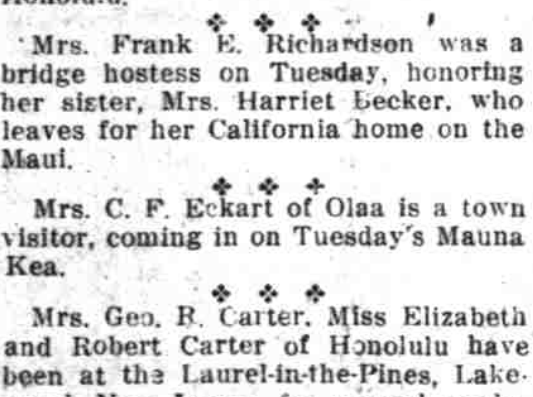
