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LITTLE DANGER ANTHRAX SPREAD, SAYS NORGAARD

Territorial Veterinarian Feels Assured Epidemic Will Be Quickly Checked

There is no danger of the anthrax outbreak on Kauai spreading through the islands or being communicated to other islands in the territory. This is the opinion today of Dr. Victor A. Norgaard, territorial veterinarian, who was asked by the Star-Bulletin for a report on the epidemic in the Garden Islands. "There is no likelihood of the outbreak spreading," said Dr. Norgaard this morning. "The infected herds are pastured in a well surrounded valley opening out on the sea; all preventive measures, including quarantine, have been taken and the cattle are being vaccinated and enough vaccine to inoculate all cattle infected or exposed to the disease should arrive very shortly and I will at once take it to Kauai and vaccinate all the cattle suffering from or endangered by the disease."

The only ranch to suffer from the epidemic is the Princeville plantation, at Hanalei, Dr. Norgaard says. There are no cattle ranches adjoining the infected pastures. Deaths of cattle from the disease to date have been about 700 head. The disease is such that no cattle ill from it can be shipped. They would die before reaching their destination. "I will vaccinate about 1000 head of cattle in the quarantined district," said Dr. Norgaard this morning. "I ordered enough vaccine Monday by cable to San Francisco, to inoculate from 7,000 to 2000 head and it should arrive soon."

Dr. A. H. Glazey, deputy territorial veterinarian for Kauai, is at the Princeville ranch in the Hanalei district, taking every precaution and enforcing the quarantine absolutely. "He will remain on duty until the epidemic has been checked and all danger is past," he said. "Some meat is blamed. As to the cause of the epidemic, the territorial veterinarian believes it due largely to bone meal imported from California, where there has been some trouble from anthrax recently. "In my annual report I warned stock growers not to feed anything but Hawaiian-made bone meal," he said. "The meat is fed with salt at the salt licks in cases where pastures are deficient in iron salts. The veterinarian warned cattle men of the territory to insist on getting only bone meal manufactured in the islands."

The entire Hanalei district is under quarantine today and one of the important things to be done after the epidemic is checked will be to do away with infection of the soil which has resulted from skinning the cattle dead from the disease. Before Dr. Norgaard reached Kauai the cattle men had been skinning the dead cattle and burying their carcasses, where the proper method to have followed should have been complete cremation of the cattle, by pouring oil on the bodies and burning them to ashes. "That is the only safe way to prevent further infection, because if the soil once gets infected the infection continues to stay in the ground and grow," says Dr. Norgaard. "The territorial veterinarian desires to assure stockmen of the territory that there is no possibility of the disease being brought here now and that with all possible precautions being taken the epidemic should be stamped out soon after the vaccine arrives from the mainland and inoculation is given sick cattle and those exposed to it."
