

## ENGINEERS HERE FORM NEW CLUB; E. KOPKE AT HEAD

Nineteen well-known engineers of the city met last night at the Commercial Club and organized a new engineering body—the Engineering Society's Club—with these 19 as charter members and about 40 throughout the islands eligible to membership.

R. Renton Hind of the organization committee, in telling of the club's plans today, emphasized that it is in no way in conflict with the Hawaiian Engineering Association. "It will occupy a distinct field," he said, "and many of the club members are of course members of the association," he pointed out.

A dinner and organization was the program last night. J. M. Young presided and officers were elected as follows:

Membership in the club is made up of those with membership in recognized mainland engineering societies. ## MCCLELLAN IN SPEECH TO VOTERS DECLARES FOR FRONTAGE-TAXING

W. H. McClellan, candidate for supervisor on the Democratic ticket, in an emphatic statement to the voters gathered at a Punchbowl rally last night, declared that he stands by the frontage tax, that he believes the sentiment of the city supports the tax, that the Democratic county platform upholds it.

"I am for the frontage tax without any ifs or ands," he told the voters.

Speaking this morning of an advertisement printed by the Republicans attacking his financial record as a member of the board of supervisors some years ago, McClellan declared the statements "absolutely false."

"I realize that it is merely a political fight on me, but at that it is absolutely unjust and a falsehood unfair in the most partisan politics," he said. "The records will show how the funds were handled, just as the records will show how the funds have been handled by the present board, through its ways and means committee. I am perfectly willing to be judged by the official records."

## DELAYS TO STOP, IRWIN ASSERTS

New Police Magistrate Tells Bar Plainly What It May Expect From Him

In a snappy, businesslike way Judge Harry Irwin, the new district court magistrate, in place of Judge T. M. Monsarrat, took the police court bench at 9 o'clock sharp this morning and disposed of the day's business in rapid fire style after addressing the court generally and the attorneys in particular on the proposed policy of the court.

There were no firewalls and few bowers. As Sheriff Joe Nobrega rapped loudly everyone stood until his honor was seated. An Kwai, a clerk in the judge's downtown office, placed a vase of handsome American Beauties on the bench and the judge spoke solemnly to a number who arrived promptly to see him take the bench.

**Warns Against Continuances**

"I wish to address a few words to members of the bar before we go on with the regular work," he said. "It is my understanding that for some time there have been complaints about this court relative to delays and continuances. Police court is a poor man's court and cases should be disposed of with the utmost dispatch. I want the attorneys to help me in this matter and with their assistance, although I do not believe that the present judge possesses a great deal more ability than the preceding one. We should be able to obviate such complaints."

**Will Frame New Rules**

The judge suggested that a committee of attorneys confer with him and upon suggestion of Attorney William Rawlins, who responded named four, Attorneys Rawlins, Camara, Straus and French, who will meet informally at his town office at 1:30 tomorrow afternoon to discuss possible rules and regulations which the judge believes will facilitate and expedite the police court grind.

In his response Attorney Rawlins explained to the court that a difficult situation for those attorneys practicing in more than one court existed in Honolulu and showed how impossible it was to avoid police court continuances when counsel was actually obliged to be at another place at the same time.

Rawlins also declared that more consideration should be shown defending counsel and complained of having been obliged to wait the whole morning to try a case in police court only to have it postponed by the prosecution after some case where counsel was not employed had taken all the court's time. Attorney Straus seconded Rawlins' statements.

Deputy County Attorney William Sheldon, who, by the way, was not deposed today by Senator Chillingworth, replied from his side of the court with the statement that he always tried to relieve counsel of any unnecessary delays. Judge Irwin closed the matter by saying it was just these things he wished to discuss with the attorney's committee.

## ASSIGN WORK TO CIRCUIT JUDGES

Judge William H. ("Billy") Heen, Hawaii's busiest jurist, opened court promptly at 9 o'clock this morning and in less than half an hour had disposed of the business of the day, which included the setting of a large number of criminal cases for trial and disposition. There were no flowers or speeches, the court setting itself into its work with surprising rapidity. Judge Heen was sworn in yesterday afternoon.

Late yesterday afternoon an order was issued dividing the work of the court among the three divisions. The order makes the following assignments:

To 1st division Judge Ashford—Equity and probate calendars; examination of applicants for licenses to practise law in the district court; duties of the water commission.

To 2nd division, Judge Kemp—Law calendar, jury and jury waive cases, land court calendar, special proceedings, including habeas corpus and mandamus.

To 3rd division, Judge Heen—Criminal, divorce and juvenile calendars.

**New Purchases Lost On Vessel**

Here are a few of the odd incidents in connection with the Hamakua disaster, as told the Star-Bulletin today by the surviving officers:

Capt. Carl W. Webert had paid \$5 for a new uniform cap the afternoon before the wreck. It went down with the boat, or rather up in the flames which destroyed it. He never got a chance to wear it.

The day of the wreck, Wednesday, was the 40th birthday of John S. Perry, first assistant engineer. He was born at a. m. May 30, 1877. At 6 a. m. May 30, 1917, he was in a lifeboat pulling away from the charred hulk, and very glad that he was alive.

Perry had also purchased some new correspondence school books on engineering. He had never opened them. They are now at the bottom of the sea. A filler and carborundum stone bought the day he boat left went down too.

Second Officer John Fisher was the unluckiest loser in wearing apparel. He lost a new suit, rubber coat, pair of shoes, books, charts, and other belongings worth all told \$45.25. He got into the lifeboat wearing a shirt and some B. V. D.'s.

Purser Kekuewa lost: \$28 cash, his and other men's money left in the strong box for safe keeping.

Chief Engineer George Porter saved only his watch and a coat. He lost his uniform, some valuable tools, and his log book.

All the boats' officers lost their licenses, which have to be displayed in a conspicuous place in the respective departments of the boat. They can get new ones by filing affidavits of the loss with the local office of the inspectors of ships and boilers.
