RACINE, Wis., Sept. 28.—Theodore Roosevelt invaded Senator La Follette's own state yesterday and addressed two great meetings, at each of which he unmercifully scored the Wisconsin senator for his pro-German actions in Congress, his seditious utterances at St. Paul and his general antagonism to the administration and the cause of Americanism.

BRITISH CAPTURE MORE THAN 1600 PRISONERS

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HOOPER IS WATCHING HAWAII OIL SITUATION

In reply to a letter from Delegate J. K. Kalaianaoale asking him to bear in mind the need for a full supply of fuel oil in Hawaii, Food Administrator Herbert C. Hoover has stated that he is watching the situation here and realizes its seriousness.

EMPLOYEES OF BANK OF HAWAII GIVEN RAISE

All employees of the Bank of Hawaii who have been receiving salaries of \$200 a month or less were given a substantial increase at a meeting of the board of directors yesterday. The move was made so that the employees could meet the increased cost of living. The increase ranges from 10 to 20 per cent over the former salaries.

QUEEN'S HOSPITAL PROBE REPORT WILL BE READY SHORTLY

Investigation by the three life members of the Queen's hospital of the charges against the management made in July by Mrs. William Mee (nee Miss Agnes Collins) has not yet been reported upon, according to A. F. Judd, one of those on the committee. While the report is nearly finished, it is not ready to turn over to the hospital authorities as yet.

GOLD EXPORT BAN IS DUE TO GERMAN PLOT

Activities of Germany in Seeking to Increase Metal Reserve Causes Embargo

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Reported activities of German agents here and in neutral countries to obtain possession of American gold, it was learned today, were largely responsible for the recent proclamation placing gold on the list of commodities requiring export licenses.

The bulk of American gold exports during the past seven months has gone to South America, mostly to Argentina and to Japan. A tremendous increase in the gold exports to Spain also is recorded. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918, exports to Spain did not exceed \$1,000,000. The following year they jumped to \$70,369,741.
