GOV. FREAR TO LEAVE MAY 14

Governor Frear announced today that governmental affairs have been so arranged that he is practically certain to leave Honolulu for the states on the steamship China, sailing May 14.

He was in consultation today with Attorney General Lindsay, Andrew Adams and Superintendent Campbell, of the Department of Public Works, in an effort to arrange for the immediate preparation of plans and specifications for the next draft on the loan fund.

Roosevelt men in Honolulu regard the result of the Massachusetts primaries, as announced yesterday, as a triumph for the doughty colonel, and declare that the majority of the delegates from the New England State will be for Roosevelt in the convention at Chicago.

H. K. BISHOP TURNS DOWN POSITION, IS STATEMENT

Engineer Bishop could have had the Superintendent of Public Works position, but he didn't want it.

Such was the declaration this morning of a prominent local businessman and engineer who knows the situation thoroughly, and who says that Bishop has turned down the chance to succeed Marston Campbell as head of the Territory's public works.

"I know that Bishop could have had the place," he continued, "but why should he want it? Why should he leave the \$500-a-month job as engineer of the Hawaii Loan Fund Commission for a \$400-a-month job here?"

POLICE RAID MOUNTAIN STILL; GET 2 AT WORK

"Okolehao," king of Hawaiian beverages, carefully contained in three large keystone tins and several wine bottles is now on exhibition in the private office of Chief of Detectives McDuffie.

Chief McDuffie, accompanied by Officers Kelleff, Olson, Fred, Belmont and Swaden, made a successful raid on the distillery and caught the Japanese and brought the "okolehao" to Honolulu today.

Before leaving Panalua this morning, at about 1:15 o'clock, Chief McDuffie burned the distillery and destroyed the outfit used by the Japanese in the manufacture of the liquor.

A jury was impaneled and the first witnesses were called for the prosecution this morning.

SENATE SANCTION FOR LOCAL WORK

Commerce Committee Approves Bill As Passed House--No Changes Affecting Territory ---Huge Sum Totaled

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 2.—Making no change in the rivers and harbors appropriations for Hawaii as they passed the House, the Senate Commerce Committee today sanctioned the rivers and harbors bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 2.—The Senate commerce committee today sanctioned the rivers and harbors bill carrying appropriations of \$32,126,530, an increase of \$8,064,010 over the House appropriation.

TUGBOAT BLOWN UP BY MINE IN TURKISH STRAITS

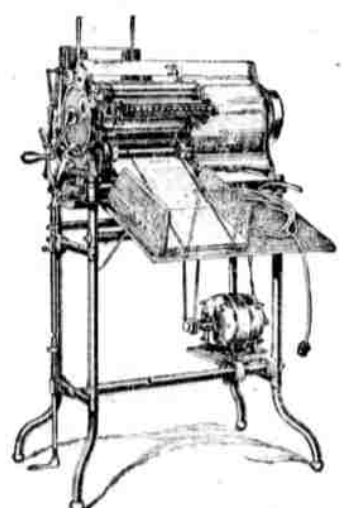
