Taking general cargo for importers and island plantations, the Inter-Island steamer Helene sailed shortly after noon hour today for Kohalaole, Panalo, Kukaia, Okaia, Lapahoehoe and Papaaloa. The Helene carried no passengers.

Six years' active service with the United States quarantine service in the capacity of master of the Federal launch has been rounded out by Captain I. Bray. According to records, the skipper has 197 round trips between the quarantine station and vessels lying off the harbor to his credit.

## INSPECTOR ON COAST ALLEGES PEST DANGER

California is being stirred up on the fruit-fly "dancer" not only by Prof. H. H. Severin, the local scientist who has been talking much and loudly, but by California officials. Under date of June 7 the San Francisco Examiner publishes the following:  
"Asserting that the actions of steamship lines in disregarding the quarantine against fruits infested with the Mediterranean fly is a menace to the millions invested in the fruit industry in California, Frederick Maskeu, chief quarantine officer at this port, is preparing a report in which he asks that he and his assistants be permitted to keep all foreign ships anchored until completely searched.

"In the report which will be received by Dr. A. J. Cook, State Commissioner of Horticulture, today, Maskeu declares that unless the local quarantine officers receive authority to detain steamers it is probable that every other precaution taken to keep the fruit pest out of the State will fail. The pest has been found in five different shipments recently.

"Professor H. H. Severin and William H. Hartung of Honolulu arrived here on the steamer Honolulu yesterday and reported that if California wished to protect her great fruit industries it would be necessary to place a quarantine against the admission of any fruit from Hawaii. They have come here to attend the State Fruit-Growers' Convention at Santa Barbara on June 12 and will try to show the men interested the danger of remaining inactive when the entire State is threatened.
