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## HEALANIS MAY BE OUT OF SENIOR RACES ON REGATTA DAY OWING TO ACCIDENT

Serious doubt now exists whether the Healanis boat club's barge crew will be able to participate in the events of Regatta Day, next September. Late examination of the new six-oared barge, Kulalani, which rammed a Japanese sampan Wednesday afternoon, has revealed the fact that the frail structure received greater damage than was suspected—a great, in fact, that it will be practically impossible to repair it for the senior event of the big day. It has been found that in addition to the badly stove-in bow, the barge is badly weakened and warped, some of the long side strips being twisted out of shape in such manner that it can only be repaired by replacing them with new strips. New pieces are obtainable here, and to properly repair the barge the services of the builder, Alf Rogers, will be necessary.

Immediately following Wednesday's accident the Healanis club officials called Rogers, asking that he rush work on the other new six-oared barge, ordered some time ago. Work on that boat has not yet begun, and it is unlikely it can be finished and shipped down here in time for the September races. So far as known at present, the Healanis boys will give the only boat racing events on July Fourth. They are planning to turn out four crews who will use the old boats. The original intention to have a program of interclub events has been declared off because many of the members of the Myrtle club have planned to attend the horse race at Hilo on the Fourth. The latter have been invited, however, to enter crews in the Healanis club's events if they desire.

## HOW THEY STAND

The Oceanic Steamship Company's liner Ventura, which was taken from the Hunter's Point drydock last week after being practically reconstructed and greatly improved, had been put through its paces in a run to the Farallones and about the bay. The vessel has already been tested and found to be eminently satisfactory. The Ventura has not been in service for four years, but will now run as a companion ship with the Sonoma of the Oceanic company's fleet to the antipodes. Before inaugurating its new schedule, the Ventura will make one trip to Honolulu sailing on June 22, to relieve the Sierra, which is being overhauled. The Sonoma will sail July 22 for Sydney via Honolulu and Pago Pago and will thereafter alternate with the Ventura. In refitting and improving the liner no details were overlooked. In addition to many luxuries and conveniences provided for the passengers, attention was paid to the speed and safety of the Ventura. The fast service which it will help to maintain will bring the Antipodes much nearer to the Golden Gate.

## SMALL RING TALK DOESN'T SOUND STRAIGHT

LAS VEGAS, N. M., June 21.—It was decided last night that the ring in which the championship fight between Johnson and Flynn shall be fought here is to be seventeen feet square.

This cable, which came over the wires last night, is a puzzle to local ring followers. If it is authentic—and there seems a good chance that it is not—it means that both Johnson and Flynn figure that they will have the edge in a smaller square. Johnson may figure that he is not physically fit to run round a full-sized ring, while Flynn may argue that his best chance is to mix it with the champion at close quarters. This is about the only way that any such agreement could be reached.

Honolulu ring fans are beginning to sit up and take notice over the coming fight, and a question that will not be settled until the curtain of night has been rung down on July 4, is, will the Big Smoke, Jack Johnson, hand his championship heavyweight title over to Jim Flynn via the fake route? Well sporting men, those who have followed the fighting game for years and years, through good and hard luck, before and since the frenzied fighting fiasco day, say, without equivocation, that if Johnson wins, he will win either on a foul or by a feigned knock-out, or that, if he wins at all, Johnson has sold out to the white man, and that he is simply daring the wrath of the fight fans and following out the general line of conduct he followed before he became champion.

Other Fellow Must Listen. Going over Flynn's past fighting record, judging his chances strictly on what he has shown, and not shown, I share the opinion of others, and that is, he hasn't a chance with the black champion, unless he is lucky enough to slip over that so-called lucky punch, which may happen in any fight, but hardly in a fight with a fussy fighter of Johnson's reputation. In the first place, Flynn is too small in physical make-up. I do not mean by this that all small men are no good, but a small man, with limited class, can not hope to put things over when he hooks up with a fighter of Johnson's kind and get away with anything, unless the other fellow has listened to reason.

In the first place, Johnson never could fight a man who could hit and hurt while he was going away. He has never met this kind of a fighter. Had he met Kid McCoy, Jim Corbett, Bob Fitzsimmons, Peter Jackson, or any other of the good old fellows, the negro would have had a new experience. Johnson is a well-footed, defensive fighter, who is almost invincible against fighters who bring the fight to him. Tommy Burns, who lost the title to Johnson, even gone back as he has, is a better man today than Jim Flynn, when it comes to general ring tactics. He lost to Johnson because he was too small in stature, Burns had to jump on his toes in order to reach Johnson with a punch, and he fought just as the Big Smoke wanted him to, for Burns had to always bring the fight to the black man. Jack Curley deserves a great deal of credit for staging the fight and spending so much money in making the arrangements. Fight promoters with less nerve would have quailed under the opposition with which he was confronted. It the fight is a frame-up, which all the wise talent expects it to be, one thing can be said of Curley, and that is, that he broke all fake-fight records for 1912, and that he staged something that no other fight promoter in the country would have dared attempt.

There is a little bit of tennis speculation who "have the habit" and who show up regularly for every tournament match. In yesterday's match he showed the benefits of the practice he played at Beretania, and his game was fully 15 steeper. He plays with great ease, and his low volleys from the mid court to catch his opponents running in, were so successful that he had Young and Littlejohn jamming on the brakes and going into the reverse half the time. He seldom hits the ball hard, but his cross-court forehand is so good, to his weakness, and began sending every return to his feet. Littlejohn played a good game, and, as usual, brought off some marvelous half volleys, but he isn't as impressive as a doubles player as in singles.

Major Timberlake and Lieutenant Williams pounded out a victory over Sinclair and Gray, "Tommy" Gray, after dropping the first set 1-6. The major was very much on, and was pounding the bulbs to good effect. Kirby Smith and C. A. Bostrom made a good fight against Irwin and Schenkel, and looked like winners after taking the first set. The major pair have played very little of late, and deserve a lot of credit for the good sportsmanship they showed in entering.
