Dole Sits In Mahuka Site Case

Judge Dole is to try the Mahuka federal building site case, the decision being arrived at after hearing the argument of interested attorneys in the federal court this morning. The shares held in E. O. Hall & Son, by Mrs. Dole, the holding of which disqualified Judge Dole, are to be sold within twenty-four hours and the case comes up again Saturday morning at ten o'clock.

Steamer Down; All Are Lost

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Jan. 11.—One hundred and seventy-two persons were drowned when the Russian steamer Russ foundered in the Black Sea in a terrific gale. All of the passengers and crew were Russian. An unsuccessful attempt was made to launch the lifeboats.

WILL DISMISS KIDNAPING CASE

ROUND ISLAND FOR MARINES
