## GETTING DOWN TO HILO WHARF BUSINESS.

Commissioner Wakefield sounded the right note at the close of Wednesday's session of the Harbor Commission when he said that there had been hearings enough; it is time for the Commission to get to work and frame its own conclusions.

This sounds like public business done on the basis of the greatest speed, commensurate with the highest standard of efficiency.

All sides have had their innings. The railway has presented its plan that is sweeping in its request for absolute control and long-term privileges. The steamship companies have had the time to go over the various projects of other transportation interests and also propose one of their own.

Now it is up to the Harbor Commission to act for and in behalf of the people. It must not only provide a plan for a Hilo wharf but do it speedily. The whole scheme has languished in the doldrums of cross-purposes and conflicting interests.

Mr. Wakefield asks that his fellow commissioners work with him every evening till the task is finished. We have no doubt that all the members will respond readily to this call, and thanks to the initiative of business men on the Commission we shall have an example of first class results under government control.

## GOVERNOR JOHNSON'S MESSAGE.

Governor Johnson of California set a new pace the other day in messages to the Legislature.

Briefly put, Governor Johnson said to the members of the California Legislature that they knew for what purpose they were summoned and there was no real necessity for going to great lengths to remind them of their duty. We quote the full text of the message:

"The Legislature has been convened in extraordinary session for the purposes that are specifically set forth in the proclamation that has been heretofore duly issued.

"When the call for the extra session was made a copy was sent to each of the members, that all might be familiar with the work necessary to be done.

"Some of the matters embraced within this call imperatively demand action. Others are formal in character. All alike, however—those that are difficult and those that are not—are submitted to you in the firm belief, justified by your previous actions, that your solution of every problem will be just, adequate and speedy.

"Because of thorough preparation and complete knowledge on your part of the matters concerning which you are to legislate, I do not attempt to specify in detail the subjects before you.

"I would, however, call to your attention one fact that is evident—that those who would wish their Legislature ill and who care nothing for the State desire that you become embroiled during this special session so that you will not within a reasonable period accomplish the purposes for which you have been called together.

"I trust, therefore, that the same spirit which you displayed with such marked success and accomplishment at your regular session will prevail in your present deliberations."

There is a wealth of common sense in that message. In the first place the Governor assumes that the members of the legislative branch of the government know their business. They are merely there to perfect a program that was presented to the people for approval and approved. More than this, the Governor keeps popular attention centered on the main issue. Refraining from elaborate explanations and pyrotechnics, he makes it more difficult for the trouble makers within and without the Legislature to do their work under cover.

## M'CANDLESS MAN ONOMEA CAPITAL HEADS UNION REMAINS SAME

But Regular Dividend Will Be Increased With New Year.

"We have not seriously discussed an increase of the capital stock of Onomea plantation," said E. Faxon Bishop, manager of Brewer & Co., in response to a query regarding the rumor of what Onomea directors might do in the near future.

Activity in Onomea for the past few days has been credited to a reported probability of an increase of capital stock. Mr. Bishop in his talk made it clear that he is not enthusiastic over capitalizing profits, though large dividends are sometimes troublesome to people who think that the industries down here are making too much money.

Mr. Bishop indicated that beginning the first of the year the regular dividend would be increased to forty cents per share, with extras to be paid through the year as the returns on sugar might or might not justify. The capital stock will not be increased.
