Cable News

MANCHU PRINCES NOT WANTED

(Associated Press Cable.)
PEKING, China, Dec. 6.—The rebels throughout the empire are strongly supporting the edict of Premier Yuan Shih-Kai, who exhorts the princes of the Manchu dynasty to re-tire from active participation in the government.

Bitter Against Manchus.
SHANGHAI, Dec. 6.—The southern revolutionists have emphatically ex-pressed their determination to efface the Manchus from the government. They insist upon a republican form of government.

Victory for Premier.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—In diplomatic circles here the abdication of Prince Chun as regent is regarded as a decisive victory for the premier, Yuan Shih-Kai.

McNAMARAS WILL TELL OF THEIR PLOTS
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 6.—It transpires that President Samuel Com-pers of the American Federation of Labor has for a long time been under surveillance of the Federal authori-ties.

KILL MOROS IN NATIVE UPRISING
MANILA, P. I., Dec. 6.—The Moros have again taken the warpath near Jolo, and in a fight today with United States troops twenty of the Moros were killed. Additional troops have been sent to the scene.

The special cause of the unrest in the archipelago among the Moros is their refusal to submit to an order for their disarmament, an order made nec-essary by their continual aggressive-ness.

URGE ABROGATION OF TREATY WITH RUSSIA
NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 6.—Ef-forts to secure the abrogation of the present commercial treaty between the United States and Russia has ac-quired a national prominence, and from all quarters pressure is being brought to bear by those who urge the abrogation of this treaty, on account of the acts of Russia in refusing to recog-nize any passport of an American citizen who is a Jew.

RAILWAY-OWNED SHIPS NOT TO USE CANAL
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—The Roberts bill was introduced in Con-gress today, and although by a Re-publican it is expected that the bill will pass. Its main point is a clause to prevent any railroad from owning or operating any vessel in the canal trade. This would mean shutting out the railroads from the use of the Pan-ama Canal or such other canals as the Delaware and Raritan.

TURBINE BOILERS NOT FOR THE NAVY
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—It was finally announced today by the Navy Department that it had been de-termined to abandon the turbine type of boilers for battleships.

The department will substitute re-ciprocating boilers on the basis that the latter are at least 30 per cent. less expensive to operate.

EMBEZZLED CRUISER'S CASH GOES TO JAIL
TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 6.—C. R. Ay-cock, who was the mail clerk on the cruiser Colorado while that warship was at the Bremerton navy yard, to-day pleaded guilty to a charge of em-bezzling \$526 belonging to members of the crew. He was sentenced to three months in the penitentiary.

HARVESTER TRUST CASE TO THE SUPREME COURT
CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 6.—The har-vester trust was today granted a writ of error in the district Federal court and the case against it in violation of the Sherman antitrust law now goes up to the United States Supreme Court.

READY FOR IMPERIAL DURBAR AT CAPITAL
DELHI, India, Dec. 6.—Their Ma-jesties King George and Queen Mary arrived in Delhi today and were re-ceived with extraordinary honors. The city is crowded with distinguished visitors for the imperial durbar.

ACCUSED OF PEONAGE.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—James Bodkin of Colorado is accused of peonage for restricting the liberty of workers in his large sugar beet fields.
