ELECTRIC MONOPOLY RECEIVES A CHECK Company Held Strictly Down to Lawful Charges.

DISTRICT JUDGE DICKEY RENDERS A DECISION

Meter Don't Govern Bills Where the Legislature Has Prescribed Specific Lamp Rates-- Evil of Monopoly.

It is considered in well-informed quarters that the monopoly of the Hawaiian Electric Company, Limited, has been brought up against a legal stone-wall, with respect to its power of exaction from customers, by Second District Magistrate Lyle A. Dickey's decision in a suit brought by the company against C. H. Brown.
