VENERABLE LADY DIES. WIDOW OF DR. HOFFMAN PASSES GENTLY AWAY. Eighty-Three Years Old And Resident of Honolulu For Half a Century—Cremation And Funeral.

A venerable and kindly personage, a familiar figure in Honolulu for more than half a century, departed from life this morning. This was Mrs. Maria Hoffman, relict of the late Dr. Edward Hoffman, who had attained the age of eighty-three years. She was a native of the State of Maine, a typical New England lady of the olden time, and had lived in Honolulu for above fifty years. At her own request the remains of Mrs. Hoffman will be cremated and the funeral will take place from her late residence in Wyllie street on Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Mrs. Hoffman leaves two nieces—one being Miss Burbank, librarian of the Honolulu Library and Reading Room Association, and the other Mrs. von Graevemeyer, a resident of Hilo. The cause of death was simply old age.

BOSS CROKER RETIRES. New York, Jan. 11.—Richard Croker announced his retirement from the formal leadership of Tammany Hall this afternoon. The announcement was made at the meeting of the executive committee, at which the plan of organization for the year 1902 was agreed upon. Lewis Nixon was chosen Croker's successor as chairman of the finance committee. This position, by long usage, carries with it the leadership of the organization.

In announcing the name of Nixon for the chairmanship of the finance committee, George M. Van Hoesen, president of the general committee, said that the step was taken at the desire of Croker himself. Croker, however, did not express himself until all the business before the meeting had been transacted, when he rose and addressed the chair. There was a distinct tinge of expectancy in the crowded room as he did so. He spoke in his habitual quiet manner, but such a stiffness prevailed that every word he uttered was clearly heard by all. His tone was conversational, but there was something like a tremor in his voice, and he walked back and forth across the room in a way not entirely familiar to those who have often heard him speak. In part he said that the appointment of Nixon to the chairmanship of the finance committee had his full approval, and he hoped that Nixon would receive the same consideration and good will that had been extended to himself.

SEVENTY, NOT SEVEN. There was a story in an evening paper about the shipment of a box to the Coast in the S. N. Castle. It is stated that there are seven tons of the wood to be taken and that this will be made into furniture, calabashes and other articles. As a matter of fact, the Castle will take in the neighborhood of seventy tons of the wood which is being sent by the Bishop Estate to Minnesota for the manufacture of show cases for the annex to the Bernice Pauahi Bishop museum at Kaneohe. The wood was brought from Napiopo, Kona Kau, and some of the logs weigh in the neighborhood of eight tons.

Mrs. Nation is still under \$200 bonds to keep the peace, which would be forfeited if she went out to another smashing tour.

FIRE ON BRITISH. Hongkong, Jan. 14.—The British steamer Manning, belonging to the Hongkong, Canton and Macao Steam Co. Company, Limited, of Hongkong, has been fired on by Chinese soldiers in the Tam Chan channel. West street. The captain of the British flag ship 'Glorious,' Charles E. L. Cowen, M.A., who was on board, was severely wounded. Glasgow, Jan. 16.—In anticipation of the duties on raw sugar and in view of the possibility of a countervailing duty on foreign refined sugar, the Clyde Crashed Sugar market opened excitedly today. He will resume work on the bench tomorrow morning. The Hawaiian Tramway Company by its manager, W. H. Pain, has filed a general denial to the complaint for damages of George W. Hayselden. John Degreaves, by his attorney, T. McCants Stewart, has filed a motion for a bill of particulars from John Stepien, who sued him for \$200 on account of supporting Mrs. Degreaves. The band will give a concert on the grounds of the Hawaiian hotel this evening, beginning at 7:30 o'clock. Captain Berger has arranged a particularly good program. It has been reported that the new steamers of the Pacific Mail Company are to be fitted with a troop to carry large bodies of troops between California and the Orient. The names of two of the yachts have been changed by their new owners. Sonny Cunha has re-christened the Shamrock III the Kahuna and Christian Coarant has renamed the Rose, the Kaamania. On account of the slowness of the delivery of sugar for the Hawaiian and Iwaland, the vessels will not get away on time. The Iwaland will sail next Saturday and the Hawaiian on Thursday of next week. Sugar on Kauai ready for shipment when the Makee left there was as follows: K. S. M., 4500; Diamond W., 1000; McBryde, 12,500; Makee, 1600; K. P., 4000; M. E. Co., 15,241; L. P., 1600; G. & R., 2000. Aylett R. Cotton Jr., a young American lawyer, was lately elected Mayor of Iloilo, Philippine Islands, defeating the native candidate by a large vote. Cotton is a native of California and a graduate of the Leland Stanford Jr. University. The steamship companies in San Francisco carrying Chinese from the Orient have been notified by the Treasury Department that they must furnish a \$500 bond for every Chinese being kept in detention while his right to land is being decided. During his present trip Vaniman will stop forty days at New Zealand and two months in Australia taking views. From the Colonies he goes to Manila, Yokohama and Hongkong, Colombo, Calcutta and through the Suez to Europe, and then to the United States. Melvin Vaniman, the well-known photographer and landscape artist, who made a reputation for himself while here by his splendid work, was a through passenger in the Ventura. He and his wife are on a tour of the world and he is going as far as the colonies in the interests of the Oceanic Steamship Company, for whom he will take pictures which will be used in advertising their lines of travel. The many pictures he took while here have been given large circulation in the United States and Europe by the company which is making ready to boom the island trip for tourists.

GARELESS BLASTING. The three Japanese arrested yesterday in connection with the dangerous blasting operations on King street near the Metropolitan Meat Market appeared in the Police Court this forenoon on the charge of common nuisance. The prosecution asked that two of the men be discharged on the ground that they did not do any of the blasting but only bored the holes for the powder. The attention of the prosecution was then turned to Morimoto, the man who had charge of the blasting operations. He pleaded guilty and made the statement that he had been doing this kind of work for a long time without any mishaps. He did not know how the accident of yesterday could have happened. The prosecution stated that the Japanese had left off one blast which had broken some of the glass about the market building. Mr. Waller went out and told the men to be more careful. Very soon afterwards came the explosion which threw heavy rocks all over the top of the building. Judge Wilcox decided that it was a case of common nuisance in the second degree and found the defendant \$25 and costs. MME NURNER INJURED. Rome, Ga., Jan. 12.—In a collision which occurred between a passenger and a freight train on the Southern Railway at an early hour this morning near Rooster station, twenty miles north of Rome, Miss Lillian Nurner, the singer, was injured. Her accompanist, E. Romano Simons, sustained a bruised hand, an engineer was killed and three other employees of the road were injured. Mrs. Nurner was thrown from her bed to the floor and her shoulder badly bruised, and the muscles of her neck were strained.

PROTEST UNCLE TOM'S CABIN. Lexington, Ky., Jan. 11.—Lexington Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy, have sent a written petition to Charles B. Scott, manager of the Lexington opera house, asking that the play "Uncle Tom's Cabin" be not played again at the opera house. They gave as reason that the best citizens and old families living in and about the city were once slave owners as a heritage, not of their own choosing; that the incidents of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" are not typical of slave life in the South, but of isolated cases; that the production of the play and its being advertised with bloodhounds and pictures of an old negro in chains and a slave owner with whip in hand, give a false idea of the times to the children of the city.
