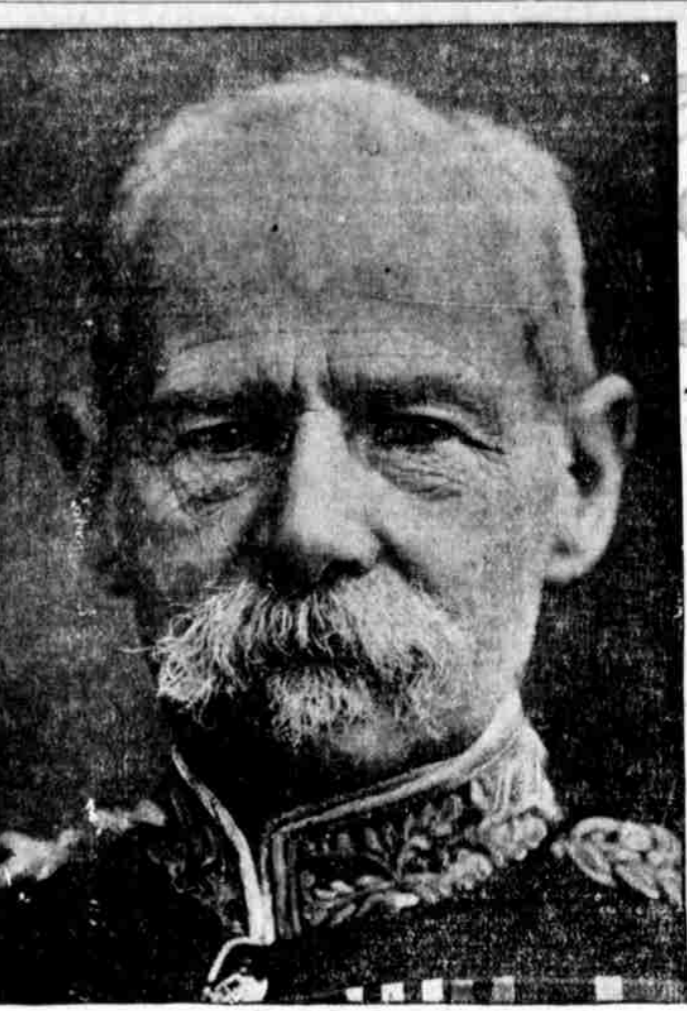

STOP HAWAII LAND SALES UNTIL CONGRESS CAN ACT

Washington, D. C., April 14.—Representative Robinson of Indiana has introduced the following bill for the purpose of meeting the decision recently made by the Department of the Interior relative to lease and granting rights of way on public lands of the Territory:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section 73 of an Act entitled 'An Act to provide a government for the Territory of Hawaii,' is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 73. That the laws of Hawaii relating to public lands, the settlement of boundaries, and the issuance of patents on land commission awards, except as changed by this Act, shall continue in force until Congress shall otherwise provide. That, subject to the approval of the President, all sales, grants, leases, and other dispositions of the public domain, and agreements concerning the same, and all franchises granted by the Hawaiian Government in conformity with the laws of Hawaii between the 7th day of July, 1898, and the 25th day of September, 1899, are hereby ratified and confirmed. In said laws 'land patent' shall be substituted for 'royal patent'; 'commissioner of public lands' for 'minister of the interior,' 'agent of public lands' and 'commissioners of public lands' or their equivalents; and the words 'that I am a citizen of the Republic of Hawaii,' or 'that I have received letters of denization under the Republic of Hawaii,' or 'that I have received a certificate of special right of citizenship from the Republic of Hawaii,' and no lease of agricultural land shall be renewed by the Government of the Territory of Hawaii (nor shall any lease, sale, or other disposition be made of, or any easement upon, over, or across the public lands of the Territory be granted to any corporation, association, or individual until Congress shall otherwise direct). All funds arising from the sale or lease or other disposal of such lands, heretofore made, shall be appropriated by the laws of the Government of the Territory of Hawaii and applied to such uses and purposes for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Territory of Hawaii as are consistent with the joint resolution of annexation, approved July 7th, 1898. Provided, That there shall be excepted from the provisions of this section all lands heretofore set apart or reserved, by Executive order or orders, by the President of the United States.

"Sec. 2. That this Act shall take effect from and after the date of the approval thereof."

Speaking of this bill Mr. Robinson said to the Bulletin correspondent: "The bill H. R. 13525 introduced by me in the House of Representatives is in direct line with the recommendations of President Roosevelt's last message to Congress. He said: 'In Hawaii our aim must be to develop the Territory on the traditional American lines. We do not wish a region of large estates tilled by cheap labor; we wish a healthy American community of men who themselves till the farms they own. All our legislation for the islands should be shaped with this end in view; the well being of the average home-maker must afford the true test of the healthy development of the islands. The land policy should be as nearly as possible modeled on our home-land system.'

"The President was justified in making these patriotic utterances, not only from the standpoint of American continental policy and protection to labor as we understand it, but as well by a hope and promise for future Hawaii. The bill I introduced is a step in the right direction.

"Congress took a great interest in Hawaii and gave it a good organic law. Appeals came to me before the passage of that bill, to inquire into
