THE MOSQUITO FLOOD.

While not assuming to take issue with the mosquito experts on the cause for recurring "epidemics" of mosquitoes, it seems reasonable to believe that there are other causes than the activity or lack of activity of the inspectors.

It has been noticed that the exceptional swarms of mosquitoes have been general throughout the town and in sections where previous to the last few weeks there had been neither inspectors nor mosquitoes.

If memory serves correctly this same condition has been noted in previous years, and at about the same time of the year. The mosquitoes appear to have been brought fairly well under control, when suddenly all sections of the town are visited by millions of the pest. The mosquito inspectors are held responsible and while we do not wish to rob them of anything that is their just due. It would be interesting and very important as well, if the men who have kept an absolute record of the conditions could tell us whether there are conditions of wind and weather that have an influence on the mosquito supply, also whether there are special breeding seasons.

It is significant that sections of the island where there were practically no mosquitoes four weeks ago, should be as liberally pestered as other portions of the town and at the same time.

As everyone who has had anything to do with it has said, the mosquito problem of Honolulu is a mighty big one. To conquer the pest means a careful research and observation carrying over a considerable period. If it be found that the mosquito thrives better and travels farther in certain kinds of weather, we cannot change the weather but it should be possible to search out the sources so as to be forearmed at the periods when "mosquito weather" may be expected.

GIRL SAYS L. H. REED TOOK HER SILVER PURSE

Chief of Detectives McDuffie is looking for L. H. Reed, a business agent, who has been soliciting advertising for a publication in Honolulu. Miss Lottie O'Malley of the Empire Theater, has reported to the police that Reed took her silver purse.

Chief McDuffie said today that Miss O'Malley reported the matter to him, emphasizing the fact that Reed would not return the purse when she demanded it. It is further claimed that Reed took the purse on the representation that he would give her an advertisement. Now Miss O'Malley wants her purse back, but as Reed is charged with having refused to return it to its owner, Chief McDuffie was asked to apprehend Reed and ask him the reason. McDuffie expects to find Reed some time this afternoon.

COMMERCIAL HOTEL SITE BRINGS IN \$9,000

The old Commercial hotel site on the corner of Nuanu and Beretania brought \$9,000 when put up to auction Saturday. It was purchased by Charles M. Cooke, Ltd. after some lively bidding.

The area is 8,168 square feet and there was a mortgage of \$2,961.08 on it, the sale being ordered by Judge W. J. Robinson. The complainant was Ruth Richardson Guard and the respondents were George W. Macfarlane and wife, Fred W. Macfarlane and wife, Mrs. Emma Macfarlane, widow and sole devisee under the will of the late Henry R. Macfarlane and a number of others. V. M. Harrison, appointed by the judge, conducted the sale.

FIRST SUITS ARE FILED, POI DEALERS VS. CITY

The first of the cases in which the Chinese poi dealers are suing the city for closing down their shops during the cholera outbreak were filed this morning in the Circuit Court by Lorrin Andrews.

Kwong Kut Chong assesses his damages at \$1665, Chang Yung at \$4522.20, Ah Sam at \$3105.10 and Sung Wo Lung at \$4580.10.

The complainants state that the city did with "force and arms and without warrant or justice in law" close their shops, and that they suffered accordingly.

Fifty persons are dead in Niiragua as a result of the recent floods on the golf coast and in the interior. The town of Renu was submerged, and the gunboat Omatepe sunk in the Renu river.

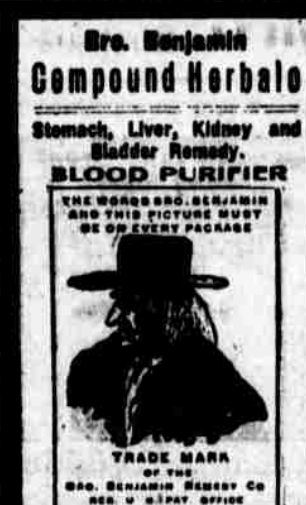
