HAWAII LOSE CLOSE GAME TO J. A. C. NINE

Mike Hardy Pitched Fine Game for Hawaii—P. A. C.s Put
It All Over the Stars—Barney Still on the Bench.

Alas! Alas! The J. A. C. managed to beat the Hawaii in one of the closest games played by Oahu League teams, the score being 1-0. The teams went in for all they were worth and fought for every point.

Both Mike Hardy, who was allowed to pitch for five innings only, on account of his work, and George Clark pitched splendid games. Before Mike was through playing he had retired nine Nipponese to the bench by the strike-out route, and it was a pity that he had to leave so soon, as it was he who had the American Japanese players guessing right through the five innings he had twirled. His smokeless shots puzzled the batters very much. On the other hand, George Clark, the ex-Hawaii player, who has now shifted over to the J. A. C. team, pitched a star game for his nine.

The crowd was a good one, and if the teams put up such games as they did yesterday, the fans will no doubt turn out in larger numbers.

One thing that can be said against the game yesterday is that there was altogether too much talk between players and Umpire Joy.

The J. A. C.s won their game from the popular Hawaii nine in the eighth inning, when Akana, who left the ranks of the bachelors Saturday night, made the lone and winning run after a close call.

The first contest turned out to be most exciting, as time and time again both teams would have men on third and then finally have their chances spoiled.

In the second inning the Hawaii pulled themselves out of a bad hole, when the J. A. C. had bases full and no outs, Clark, Friesell and even Chillingworth failing to bring any of the waiting men home.

Notley of the J. A. C. played a star game, pulling down all kinds of flies. He won at bat four times, and on each occasion reached first safely. The Hawaii team put up some good double plays during the afternoon.

In the second match of the day Marcellino's ball-tossers were badly defeated at the hands of the struggling P. A. C.s, who can smile now as being tied with the J. A. C. for first place in the series. The score was 8 to 2. The Stars just by accident managed to get two runs in the first inning, but from then on the scoreboard showed eight ciphers for the Stars, who failed to shine very brightly.

Hits on both sides were plentiful. The Portuguese netted fourteen hits off Williams, who seemed to have a bad day.

The game was 2-2 up to the lucky seventh, when the P. A. C. bunch added three runs, and then again in the ninth they touched Williams for four more runs, making the total score 8-2 in favor of the P. A. C. aggregation.

First Game.
The Hawaii were the first to face the music, and Clark had them going in short order. The J. A. C. started out well. Friesell bunted and soon after reached second when Akana knocked a beauty over short. Both Franco and Brito fanned, while Akana died at third.

The Nipponese came back in their half of the second, and it looked as though they would pile up two or three runs. Notley got safe on a bunt; Kealoha binged to third, who threw to second, but Ayau fumbled. Both safe. Louis came up and swatted one to first, who threw to Markham to nab Notley on third, but it was too late. Full bases and nobody out. Clark came up and what did he do but strike out. Friesell came up next, but did not manage to lay the ball on the ground, so he was out on a fly to second. "Kiddo" Chillingworth, the lad who does great things at times, made the third unsuccessful attempt to get a man home by being out on a hit to third. It was certainly a great relief to the Hawaii when he was disposed of.

In the fourth the Hawaii boys had a chance to score, but Notley, who had no right to catch Mike Hardy's long hit to center which looked good for a run by Markham, a two-base hit for himself, spoiled the soup by pulling down the liner for three outs.

This act on the part of Notley made Mike sore, so when the J. A. C.s came in Notley was the first to face him and was given free transportation to first. Well, this made him more sore, so when Kealoha came up to the plate he sent some smokeless shoots over the plate and then gave Kealoha a free pass to the bench by the strike-out road. He had two more tickets left, so he handed them to Clark and Louis, who also failed to connect.

In the sixth the Hawaii bunch missed another chance to score. Ayau, who was given a free pass to first, stole second and third in quick fashion, and stole home on Desha's bunt, but the latter was too late in reaching first, so the run did not count. Ayau was the first man to get a walk off Clark, in the sixth.

Mike Hardy, who had been cutting the edge of the plate in fine style with his almost invisible curves, had to quit in the fifth, so Lota filled his position in the sixth and allowed the first man to walk.

Markham started the seventh with a two-bagger, but his team-mates failed to bring him home.

It was a sad when for the Hawaii in the eighth, when Akana, who had been twice struck out by Hardy, romped home for the winning run. It happened this way: Chillingworth walked, Akana hit to third, and Henry was forced out at second. Then Ayau tried to make a double play, but threw wild, and Akana went to second. Franco was out on a bingle to third. Brito came up to the plate with a smiling face and, to everybody's surprise, sent out the winning hit over short which brought Akana home. Notley was retired on a fly to left field.

In the ninth the Hawaii failed to score, and the J. A. C.s won their first game from the Hawaii nine after a hard rub.

Second Game.
In the very first inning the P. A. C. netted two runs and got four hits off Williams for a start. Bushnell was safe on a bunt, Ornellas landed a two-bagger to right field, Bushnell came home. Deponte placed one to the same spot and Ornellas arrived.

In the second inning the Stars annexed one, Aylett doing the trick. Marcellino sent a dandy to third, who muffed it, and Aylett romped home.

The third inning was in favor of the P. A. C. Souza, the hard worker of the Portuguese team, made the inning lively by stealing second and third in short order. He then started to steal home and would have been safe if he had gone all the way, but he turned back before he got half way and as a consequence died at third.

In the fifth Miller made the last run for the Stars. In the seventh the P. A. C. struck luck and added three runs, Lino, Soares and Flierz making the circuit. In the ninth Williams was hit hard, and before he had a chance to leave the box the Portuguese had four more runs. Souza, Bushnell, Soares and Freitas were the ones to add to the score on this occasion. This ended the game, 8-2, after a very interesting contest.
