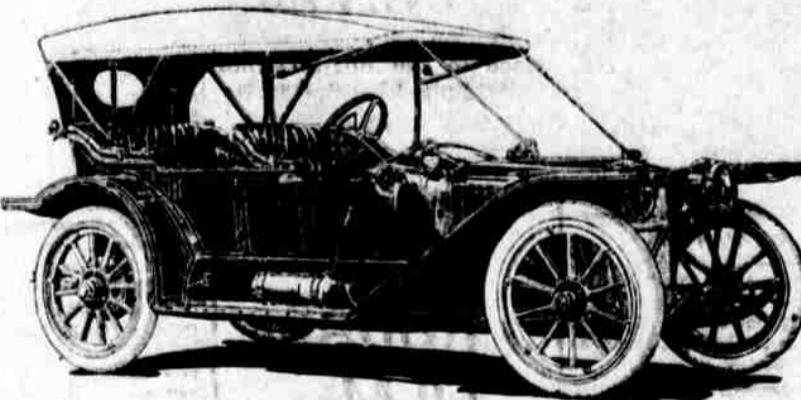

TRACK MEN BUSY THIS WEEK

Entries Close Today—Men Finishing Up Hard Work—Good Races.

Entries for the first track and field meet held under the auspices of the A. A. U. will close this afternoon at 5 o'clock at the Hawaiian News, with John Soper. The entries for the meet should be large, and many of the stars will be seen in action on the day of the event. The crowd that will turn out should exceed that which has attended any track meet held in Honolulu.

As this meet is for the purpose of establishing new records for the Hawaiian Islands, all those who have made records in the past should be on hand to retain them if possible, as previous records will be wiped off the sheet after the coming meet. Among the athletes who are going to try and hold fast to their records will be Frank Kane of the Kams, who will enter the 16-pound hammer throw and the shot-put. Bill Rice will be on hand to hold on to some of his records.

Our only Bill Rice has a scheme up his sleeve for the coming meet, and it is known on good authority that he will let go the 229-yard low hurdles and probably the 449-yard run. If he takes up the 449-yard run he will not tackle the 229-yard sprint.

Jimmie Fitzgerald has been with Rice for the last few nights, and he has given Bill a good piece over the half-mile course. Jimmie Fitzgerald, when asked what he thought of Bill Rice, said: "In my opinion Rice is no good as a sprinter, but a dandy half-mile runner. He has the stride and is strongly built. I think it would be better for him to tackle the half mile than to try the 449-yard run, as he would certainly establish a new record for the Islands over the longer distance."

Rice is slated to go into the 169-yard dash, half mile, 449-yard dash, 229-yard dash and the broad jump. It is believed that he will leave out either the 449-yard or 229-yard event.

Hans Fossuth has been busy during the week in training for the high jump. Hans claims that if Hopper arrives tomorrow from Kauai to compete in the meet Saturday he will have to go some in order to beat the former record-holder. Eriessen will be another man in the jumps, but the athletes here have little or no idea of his prowess in the jumps.

The admission to the grounds Saturday will be 25 cents, and the crowd should be a large one. All the officials have been chosen and the track is being put in the best of condition now. The track at Alexander Field is a sandy, and the men should make good times.

The Kamehameha Alumnus has put up a team which is composed of some promising athletes. Frank Kane was a sure record-holder for the meet on their toes all the time.

Mackenzie and Bill Rice are old rivals, and to see these two in the sprints again would certainly be a treat to the local sports. He is now up to G. Manoha and Bill Ross to give Rice a run for the honors.)

Bill Ross will enter for the quarter mile, and he is pretty good at that distance. He will buck up against Rice, Joe Knuhl and Godfrey in this event. Johnny Fernandez should make a good showing in the sprints at the coming meet.

WAR CLOUDS HAD EARLY INFLUENCE ON SUGAR

Alexander & Baldwin received a letter yesterday from their New York branch manager dealing with sugar market conditions. Speaking of the European situation, he says:

"The London beet market continued to show that the speculators were in control up to the close of the 11th, when October quotations advanced to 18-3 (5.95c N. Y.). Today the closing was 17-5 1/2 (5.75c) a decline in two days equal to .18c. per lb. in New York cane terms. The two markets are now at a parity. This decline is reported to be due to the selling of outsiders (speculators) outside the depressed European situation. The decline has taken place even though the weather in Germany as reported by Licht on the 12th continues unfavorable for the growing crops. In Germany there has been a small sized panic due to poor crop and trade conditions and contraction of credits. In France there has been a general wave of financial conservatism, calling in of deposits in foreign countries and contracting credits at home. Besides all this there are war clouds in the air."

BISHOP ST. COMMISSION FINISHES AND REPORTS

The active work of the Bishop street extension commission is finished for the time being, its report going before the Governor.

The Sullivan & Buckley property will go in the report with a recommendation for purchase at \$100,000, although the commission states that it does not think the property is worth this amount.

It is now up to the Governor to decide as to whether or not this amount is to be paid for the property which cannot be proceeded with. It is thought very probable, however, that the price will not be paid but condemnation proceedings started instead.

The property is assessed for taxation purposes at \$12,000, which is \$1,000 below the assessment for last year.
