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KUHIO CHARGES MADE

SMITH, ALLEGED SMUGGLER, IS BACK HERE

Man Charged With Being Clever Opium Operator Brought Under Guard.

STRONGLY MAINTAINS COMPLETE INNOCENCE

Federal Authorities Say He Was Formerly Quartermaster on Steamer Running to This Port.

Strongly declaring his innocence in connection with the indictment brought against him by the Federal Grand Jury of smuggling and selling opium in Honolulu, Norman B. Smith, alias W. B., alias M. B. Smith, is in Honolulu, having arrived from San Francisco, where he was arrested by Marshal Elliott, this morning on the steamer Honolulu. He was brought down by Deputy Marshal B. F. Towle and Guard M. C. Elliott.

When arrested in San Francisco Smith emphatically declared his innocence. "I know nothing about it," he said, "and when I got to Honolulu and come up for trial I will soon prove my innocence." At the same time the Federal authorities seem to think that they will make this harder than Mr. Smith may think at the present time.

Until June last he was quartermaster on the American-Hawaiian steamer Columbian. He comes from Maryland and although he refuses to say what town, it is thought that Baltimore is the city he hails from.

DELEGATE KUHIO LAYS FORMAL COMPLAINT OPEN WAR IS CARRIED BEFORE SECRETARY OF INTERIOR NOW

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 27.—The charges made by Delegate Kuhio against Governor Frear have been received at the Department of the Interior. These are the charges in which the Delegate from Hawaii protests against the reappointment of Frear as Governor, and were received in the mail a day or two ago.

When the Bulletin correspondent called at the Department this morning the Secretary in charge stated that he did not feel at liberty to make public the text of the Delegate's letter until the arrival in Washington of Secretary Fisher, who is expected here on October 10.

It is understood in general terms that the Delegate, while not charging the Governor with specific malfeasance in office, holds him responsible for slow progress toward American ideals in administration and government, and that he is entirely out of touch with the sentiment of the people. It is also understood that the Delegate takes up some transportation matters.

The charges after being read by Secretary Fisher will be taken up with the President, and possibly a commission named to investigate conditions, though it is understood that a secret investigation that includes the status of the sugar industry and labor conditions has been under way for some time by a Federal agent.

HAWAII'S ROAD EXPERT IS HERE

Robert K. Bishop of New York, noted highway engineer and road expert, arrived this morning on the Matson liner Honolulu and will remain in Honolulu until he leaves for the island of Hawaii. The work of road building with the funds provided by the last Legislature has been held back for months, awaiting the arrival of Mr. Bishop, but is expected to proceed rapidly now. DR. M'COY WILL SUCCEED DR. CURRIE

Leprosy Expert Transferred at Own Request in Course of Service Routine.

EMPHATIC DENIALS OF FRICTION IN WORK

Territorial and Federal Officials Pull Together to Stamp Out Disease—Clegg to Remain.

Dr. Donald H. Currie, head of the Federal leprosy investigation work here, will leave the islands about December first and will probably be assigned to a mainland station by Surgeon-General Wyman, head of the U. S. Public Health and Marine Hospital Service. He will be succeeded by Passed Assistant Surgeon George W. McCoy, now in California.

Dr. Currie does not, however, leave because of any friction in the office, hinted in an article in the morning paper today, nor because of any objections to the work he has been carrying on.

The whole fabric of the story printed this morning is not only denied by those concerned but resented by Federal officials and those generally who have been acquainted with the highly successful work that Dr. Currie has been carrying on at the Leprosy Investigation Station at Kalaheo. It is at his own request that Dr. Currie has been transferred. It is no secret, nor has it been, that his four years' term of duty, under the service rules, was up on July first and that he had asked to be transferred to a mainland station. Not only is his request granted in a letter received today, but Surgeon-General Wyman has complimented him highly upon his work.

Foster's Job Cinched

Strong denials of any connection with the charges laid against them by Masters' and Pilots' Association and also that W. R. Foster, the man slated for harbormaster and who is to take up his duties on October 1, had any intention of resigning, were registered this afternoon by Commissioner McStocker, W. H. Hoogs and Foster himself, at a meeting of the harbor commission held in the Senate chamber.

One feature of the denials were the opposed statements of Commissioner McStocker and Mr. Hoogs in connection with the first knowledge of the latter had of Foster's appointment. McStocker declares that he was the first to inform Hoogs while the latter stated that his informant was Commissioner Wakefield.

Mr. McStocker referred to the stories published yesterday and also the talk that was going along the waterfront as a "lot of cackles." "Anyone would think they had found a fresh egg," he said, "whereas I think it was hardly that." He also stated that Hoogs when asked about the matter at first said that even if Foster was not appointed he would keep him in his position.

Hoogs stated that as soon as he knew that the commission wanted Foster he tried to dissuade him. "Why only yesterday," he said, "I told him he was a fool and I told him so again this morning. I told him that in three months I would take him back. I do

not want him to go for it means a lot more work thrown on me." Foster was not to be denied and before the meeting came to order jumped up and said that what McStocker and Hoogs had stated was right and that anything different from that was an absolute lie. He was not going to resign and the only thing that would shift him would be a stick of dynamite.

A conference of the harbor commissioners that lasted a large part of this morning in the offices of Superintendent Marston Campbell, chairman, resulted in the definite announcement that William R. Foster has not resigned as harbormaster that he will not resign and that he will take office on October 1. The announcement constitutes a denial of all the reports circulating yesterday and of which a denial from Mr. Foster himself was published in the Bulletin.

The conference this morning was executive. From what can be learned, the commissioners compared notes and tried to find out where the reports originated and how it happened that Capt. D. F. Nicholson of the Inter-Island company thought he had something that looked like an offer of the position. It appears from statements made after the meeting today that F. B. ROLPH WINS BY OVER 24,000 VOTES

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 27.—Unofficial returns from the city election give James Rolph Jr. 49,500 votes and P. H. McCarthy 25,000. Rolph is elected mayor by a majority even his friends did not anticipate. One hundred and eighty out of 356 precincts give District Attorney Fickert 12,351 votes for reelection against 11,605 for Hathorn.

Rolph's victory was welcome in Honolulu. Today the commercial bodies sent him cablegrams of congratulation, and many went from private sources also.

Free Garbage Decided

That Honolulu is to have a free and extended garbage system from January 1 of next year, and this without any additional cost to the community, is the verdict that was arrived at this morning when a conference was held between the committee of the Civic Federation, consisting of E. A. Bernad and W. A. Bryan, and Dr. J. S. B. Pratt, president of the Board of Health; Secretary E. A. Mott-Smith and the Governor.

The new plan becomes practicable owing to the law passed by the last Legislature bringing the division of the tax money under a new schedule. The total cost will be \$60,000, or roughly \$50,000 above the present cost. The incinerator is to be run and the scope of the system will be greatly enlarged, taking in all those districts that need it but which at the present time do not get it.

One of the main reasons for putting the incinerator into working order is that, outside of its being generally beneficial, a recommendation has been made by E. K. Carnes, the California expert, backing up the assertion of local authorities here that the safest method of dealing with the fruit fly is to burn the infected fruit.
