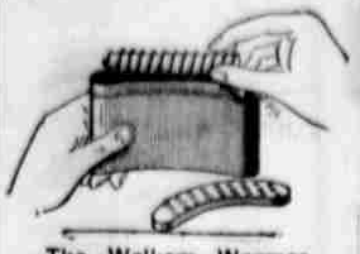

DRUGGISTS ASK FOR NEW LABELS

Japanese Association Apply to Food Inspector for Assistance.

In response to an offer made by the Japanese druggists of Honolulu, E. B. Bauchard, the food commissioner, has undertaken the work of correcting the labels on some of the Japanese drugs that are sold locally—to bring the labels into accord with the Federal pure food act.

Translations of the labels now used upon the Japanese drugs are being made by a Japanese pharmacist, the medicines included numbering about two hundred and fifteen.

The medicines sold promise cures for everything that afflicts humanity, and the labels declare the claims of the manufacturers in this regard. The Japanese Druggists' Association will send the corrected labels back to the manufacturers with the request that they be altered to meet the requirements of the United States law. Much credit is given to the association for its progressive stand in the matter.
