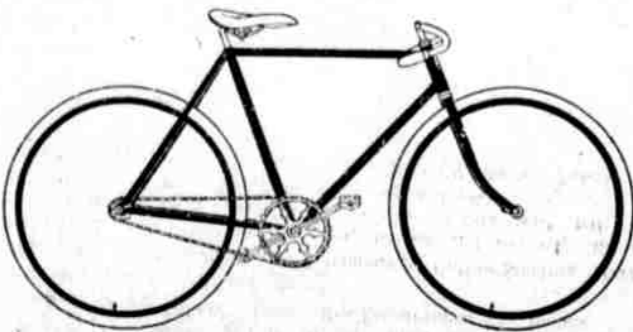

COMPANY F HAD TEN POINTS LEAD OVER G IN FIELD MEET

FINAL SCORES WERE 47 FOR F, 37 FOR G, 13 FOR H AND 12 FOR E COMPANY--H WON BASKETBALL MATCH. INTENSE RIVALRY EXHIBITED.

Late this afternoon the final events in the Fort Shafter meet will have been finished and the meet have passed into history. The events on today are the rifle match, soccer game and bowling tournament.

In the field events yesterday, Company F of the Twentieth won with a total of 47 points, and in the basketball game Company H's team was victorious with a score of 19 to 11. In order the other companies stood: G, second place, with 37 points; H, third, with 13; and E at the bottom of the list, with 12 points to its credit.

In the relay race, which was an event in which entire companies competed, every man doing 100 yards, Company F won, with Company H second.

In the blank cartridge race, F and G tied for first place, Corporal Spier representing F and Private Mercer being the Company G man.

Company H won the wheelbarrow race by Private Johnson and Private Little of E finished second.

In making fire and holding water, E carried off the honors with Private Morse, and F came second with Private Worth.

Then Company G won the striking tent and rolling blanket contest with the team composed of Corporal Smith and Private Gongol.

Corporal Richter and Private Herrick of F won the live-load race, with Company H second, represented by Privates Howell and Krapek.

Private Longford of H won the shoe race, and Private Fay came in second.

Entire companies participated in the call to arms, Company F winning by having its men dressed and in line for inspection in 2 1/4 minutes. Company G was second.

In the centipede race there were teams composed of eight men each, and this was won by Company G with its team made up of Sergeant Nichols, Corporal Smith, Artificer Vickers and Privates Bowers, Carroll, Henry, Hughes and Plummer. Company F was second, and the men on that team were Sergeant Simonous, Corporals Richter, Falkenstein and Patton, Artificer Buford and Pri-

vates Maxwell, Keen and Williams. It took Private Harris of Company E just 21 seconds to win the diving contest, this being the diving to the bottom of the tank and picking up twelve objects before rising to the surface. Private Johnson won second place for Company H in this event.

Private Maxwell of Company F won the 100 yards' swimming contest, doing the distance in one minute thirty-three and one-fifth seconds. Private Brown of G took second place.

The tug-of-war was the last event and was won by G in the final pull with Company F.

The basketball game was one for blood, and the men looked as though they had been in a hard fight when it was over, with H team victorious over the team picked from the other companies by a score of 19-11.

The lineup: Company H--Sergeant McCall, center; Sergeant Woodruff and Cook Durant, forwards; Privates Marsh and Collins, guards. Yeager took Marsh's place in the second half. Picked team--Private Fulton, center; Corporal Marks and Lieutenant Chilton, forwards; Hingle and Will Chapman, guards.
