Cable News PEARL HARBOR BIG COAL DEPOT

(Associated Press Cable.)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—Secretary of the Navy Meyer appeared before the Naval Committee of the House today to urge upon that committee a favorable consideration of his plan to establish a great reserve coal depot at Pearl Harbor, Oahu.
The secretary pointed out the necessity of having a reserve supply of coal somewhere on the Pacific, the difficulty of transporting this necessity being great in time of peace on account of the inadequacy of the American merchant marine to furnish a sufficient number of colliers, making the transportation of the fuel in foreign bottoms practically obligatory. In time of war, however, he pointed out, the use of foreign colliers would be impossible.

The logical place for a reserve coal depot, he declared, is at Pearl Harbor, where the naval department is preparing to have the greatest naval station of all.
To begin the work of storing coal in Hawaii for naval purposes, the secretary asked the committee to vote an appropriation for a coaling station where one hundred thousand tons could be stored.
Seattle Firm Lowest Bidder.
Bids were opened at the navy department here today for the contract of supplying the coaling for the Pearl Harbor drydock, now well under way in construction. The lowest bidder was the Moran Company of Seattle, which submitted a figure of one hundred and ten thousand dollars.

DARING AVIATOR MAY BE DROWNED

DOVER, Dec. 22.—Cecil Grace, one of Great Britain's most daring aviators, is thought to have lost his life in attempting to cross the channel tonight. All the channel shipping within reach of the wireless has been notified to keep a lookout for the aviator, there being some hope that he is alive, floating on the water, but this hope is slight.
Grace was undertaking the most daring series of flights yet attempted, in an effort to gain the prize of twenty thousand dollars offered by the Baron de Forrester, the naturalized Hungarian nobleman, the conditions of which were that the aviator must cross the channel from a British starting point, reach the Belgian frontier and return to England in one day.

Grace left here this morning, and completed the first part of the trial successfully, crossing the channel and flying to the frontier of Belgium, where he swung back as far as Calais. There he spent some hours in resting and then resumed his flight, back across the channel for this point. News of his starting was sent from Calais and a large gathering of notables, newspaper men, friends and others were here to greet him. Up to a late hour tonight, however, no word of his landing anywhere upon the English coast has come, nor had he returned to France.

EXPLORER COOK COMES BACK HOME

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—Doctor Cook, whose claim that he had discovered the North Pole startled the world no more than his recent impudent assertion that possibly he may have been mistaken, arrived here today from London, where he has been living in hiding for the past several months.
Interviewed upon landing, the ex-posed faker declared that he had returned to America for the purpose of regaining the goodwill of his fellow countrymen.
He has prepared a number of magazine articles on his hallucination, as he now terms it, regarding his polar discoveries, and it is probable that he will attempt to deliver a number of lectures.

EXPLOSION FOLLOWS FIRE

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—Tonight, after the fire which had brought death to Chief Horan and twenty-three of his faithful men, had been got under control, a tremendous explosion occurred in the building, supposed to have been in the cold storage part of the works. The force of the explosion was terrific, and immediately following it a four-story brick wall came crashing down. Fortunately no one was within the danger zone when this last accident occurred.

Relief work among those families suddenly thrown out of employment at this Christmas season by the destruction of the packing plant has been commenced.
