LURLINE HERE ON WEDNESDAY MORNING

Nearly five thousand tons of cargo is destined to arrive from San Francisco on Wednesday morning, according to a wireless received through the agency of Castle & Cooke, the local representatives for the Matson Navigation steamer Lurline.

The Lurline was reported as 750 miles off the port at 9:30 last night. For Honolulu there are four thousand eight hundred tons of freight and included in this amount are five automobiles. The Lurline is bringing 695 tons freight to be discharged at the port of Kahului.

Passengers for Honolulu number 46. A mainland mail amounting to 58 sacks is due to arrive by the Matson vessel as well as 156 packages express matter.

The Lurline should show up off the port about 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning. The vessel is steaming through smooth seas and pleasant weather.

MAUIANS DO NOT LIKE METER

Sunday last District Overseer Bal installed a big water meter alongside the road and a little below the reservoir, for the purpose of measuring the amount of water drawn daily from the Government reservoir.

The work was begun early Sunday morning and by three o'clock in the afternoon when the flood gate was opened the big meter was at work registering a flow of 18,000 gallons of water an hour. Monday morning following the people of Walluku, not all but few here and there were complaining, the Maui News printing establishment among them that they could get no water.

Finding that the meter was retarding the flow of water more than was expected, District Overseer Bal had it disconnected, and now everything is running as smoothly as it was before the water meter idea was ever thought of.—Maui News, July 30.

SEAQUAKE JOLTS BIG MONGOLIA

Passengers Believed That Vessel Bumped A Whale

A sea quake of no mean proportion jarred the big Pacific Mail liner Mongolia which passed through Honolulu on Saturday on her recent voyage from the Orient. The steamer was off the Pescadore at the time the convulsion of the earth gave the huge craft a jolt that startled every one on board. Some thought that the vessel had touched bottom, others that there had been a collision with a whale or a piece of submerged wreckage, others that the tail shaft had snapped off.

The passengers were at luncheon and with the first jolt the meal was suspended, although everyone kept his place. A few seconds later came another but lighter shock and naturally it did not allay the feeling of uneasiness that went through the ship.

But nothing else happened, the comforting pound of the engines kept up and the ship moved forward in all staidness.

The few who had been in seaquakes before were very sure of what had happened. As a matter of fact the Mongolia was at the time well out in the channel with thirty fathoms of water under its keel and there was no chance that the disturbance was due to any other cause.

"There must have been some very severe submarine disturbance," said one of the passengers. "I am informed that the seismographs did not record the disturbance but it certainly was sharp. It jolted that big ship sharply and there was a report that sounded like a collision. My first thought was that one of the shafts had broken but a second later I could make out the steady throb of the engines and knew that the incident did not lie there."
